Two Men Hurt In Car Crash Near Mt. Airy—Stokes Boys In The Smash-Up

Mount Airy, Oct. 2.—Two men were injured, one seriously, this afternoon about 4 o'clock when two cars crashed head-on three miles east of here on the West-field highway.

Claiborne Taylor, 25, of the Cook's school community, suffered a fractured left arm and laceration to an ear which almost severed the member from his head. He is a patient at Martin Memorial Hospital here. His condition was reported as serious.

Clayton Cardwell, 28, of Francisco, Stokes county, suffered a lacerated wrist and the loss of blood. He was given treatment at the hospital here.

Billy Taylor, Herbert Taylor and Roby Love, all of the Cook's school community, were riding in the coupe operated by Claiborne Taylor. They were not injured.

Glenn George, 20, of Francisco, operator of the coach, Early George, Joe Bill George, and an unidentified CCC enrollee from the Danbury camp, also escaped injury.

Sheriff Harvey S. Boyd said Glenn George was cited on a charge of reckless driving. He said Claiborne Taylor will be charged with reckless driving and operating a car intoxicated when he recovers from his injuries.
