Winston-Salem, Oct. 2.—Thirteen warehouses will be operated here during the season which opens October 10, J. T. Booth, sales supervisor, announced today.

He listed the warehouses which will be operated during the season as follows: Farmers, Planters, Taylor's, George Davis', Piedmont, Brown's, Glenn's, Liberty, Pepper's, Gorrell's, Carolina, Central and Banner.

"This will be welcome news to the thousands of tobacco growers selling in Winston-Salem," Mr. Booth remarked.

Winston - Salem, the world's greatest tobacco center, is prepared as never before to handle the great crop from many counties of North Carolina and Virginia. With its 13 warehouses

FIRST WEEK FOR THE TRIAL OF CRIMINAL CASES—SECOND WEEK TO BE DEVOTED TO CIVIL ACTIONS—LARGE CRIMINAL DOCKET.

Court begins here next Monday with the largest criminal docket for years. Judge Zeb V. Nettles will preside and Ralph Scott, solicitor, will prosecute for the State.

Two capital cases are on for trial, to-wit:

State vs. Eli T. Rogers, charge, murder;

State vs. Claude Southern, charge, manslaughter.

Most of the other cases on the docket are for violations of the liquor laws, reckless driving, drunk driving, etc.
