NOTICE TO TOBACCO GROWERS

SEE COUNTY AGENT BEFORE OCTOBER 28 REGARDING 1939 ALLOTMENTS.

Any producer of Stokes county who has, since November 1, 1938, purchased or sold land involving the transfer of 1939 tobacco allotments should contact the county agent's office in Danbury on or before October 28, 1939 for confirmation of these purchases and transfers of tobacco allotments. Any request for transfer after that date cannot be approved because of the recent ruling from the Raleigh office that these changes must be made on that date.

It is suggested that producers who are parties of transactions of this kind file a written agreement as to the number of acres of the tobacco allotment which are to be transferred from one grower to another with the purchase of land.
