## SUPT. CARSON IS RE-ELECTED

**Leader of the Stokes School Regime Selected For His 24th Year In Service—Construction Of Walnut Cove New School Building To Start In Two Weeks—New Additions Asked At Other Schools—Board of Education Has a Busy Day.**

The Stokes county school board had a busy day Monday, its three members being present, as follows: Dr. G. E. Stone, chairman; P. O. Fry, J. Van Tuttle, and Supt. of Schools J. C. Carson, whose 11th term of service as head of Stokes educational work expires in July. He was reelected for his 12th term. Prof. Carson first assumed his present position in 1919.

Orders were made for the beginning of work on the new Walnut Cove high school building within two weeks. This project, which will cost \$70,000.00 is to be paid for as follows: county funds, \$25,177.00; federal funds, \$31,815.00. This outlay includes building and grading for playgrounds.

Do not forget the deadline date of April 15th. About 30 farmers in Stokes county are eligible for grain certification.
