CONFIDENCE IN ROOSEVELT CLIMBS TO AN ALL TIME HIGH

A nation-wide poll announced recently that President Roosevelt's personal popularity has climbed to an all-time high.

The poll attributes the rise in the President's popularity to the international crisis and the repeated tendency of the American people to turn to the militant leader of the Democratic party.

The latest nation-wide survey finds that 73 per cent of voters with opinions on the subject express a vote of confidence in Franklin D. Roosevelt. Only 27 per cent said they disapproved of him as president.

His new popularity figure tops the 71 per cent found supporting the President at the time of his third term inaugural in January, and the 72 per cent recorded in a similar survey last month.

The President was re-elected last November with 55 per cent of the majority party vote.

More than 80 separate surveys have been conducted on Roosevelt's standing with the public during the past seven years. These have shown that Roosevelt has never been a 'minority president'—that is, his popularity, as recorded in these surveys, has never fallen below the 50-50 line, although there was a time—in September, 1935—when the President received only 50.5 per cent support.

Until this spring the highest points in the personal popularity index were 60 per cent in the beginning of 1934, and 70 per cent in May, 1940, when the Nazi armies were overrunning France.

All projects now in operation will be open for the inspection of visitors throughout the day June 26 and everyone is invited to visit local NYA projects and view the work being accomplished in the county.

The state celebration of the anniversary will be marked by the dedication of the Raleigh resident center, at which time Governor J. M. Broughton will bring greetings and June Rose, chairman of the state advisory committee of the NYA, and State NYA Administrator John A. Lang will speak.

A radio broadcast will be presented over station WPTF in Raleigh June 26, at which time Mr. Lang will speak on the history and program of the National

During the year ending June 30, the National Youth Administration has provided part-time jobs for approximately 27,000 out-of-school youths. Another 13,000 youths have been provided with jobs which enabled them to continue their education in the state's school and colleges.

Through work experience on NYA projects and through related training in classrooms while employed by NYA, the National Youth Administration enables young people to coordinate work theories and practice and acquire a well-rounded background.

As a national defense agency, the NYA is participating in the defense program through the training of skilled workers for defense industries, the rehabilitation of rejected selectees to raise them to physical standards for military service, and the manufacture of gun racks, garments, desks and other office equipment for use by the army.
