Hyde Park, N. Y .- With a firm ness undiminished by the latest phases of Europe's war, President Roosevelt voicer once again Monday a hope that the Concl States could keep out of the conflict.

Certainly Americans—and he included himself in his statement -were all against war just a they were all against sin, he as serted.

Yet, with the caution with which he always has appraised publicly America's chances of keeping out of the fighting, the Chief Executive did not go so far as to say he believed the nation could remain at peace.

In fact, he went to some pains, at a press conference, to make it plain that he was voicing only a hope, as he has done many times
