Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Carroll of King are to be congratulated on the fine lot of fruit and vegetables which they have grown on their town lot. From the peach trees growing in the yard and poultry lot, 58 quarts of peaches have already been preserved. Other fruit from the trees was consumed in the home and given to the neighbors and relatives. Several varieties of apples, grapes and other tree fruits are being grown for the family food supply. Nine varieties of vegetables were noted in the Carroll garden ready for daily use on the table.

Mrs. Carroll is doing much canning this season anticipating higher food prices in the winter. This practice is found on many farms of the county. It is hoped all families will store ample supply of canned and preserved foods for the winter months—reports are that food prices are sure to be high.

The tobacco crop was damaged by hail and wind on farms in the Collinstown community last week. Several of these hail beaten farmers are selling milk. "The bi-monthly milk check is a great aid in this time of bad crops," stated Mr. Jasper J. Martin of Collinstown community.

W. S. Hart of the Lawsonville community purchased a registered Angus bull from the Transou herd of Alleghany county.

We have just received a new bulletin, inexpensive practices for Controlling Diseases of vegetable Crops, which will be given free to anyone coming to the office requesting it. It is a worthwhile bulletin and farmers are urged to take advantage of its use.

Farmers may be interested to know three combines owned by Stokes Farmers are available for harvesting clover seed, grass seed and lespedeza seed, as well as small grain. R. C. White of King, John Christian of Pinnacle and Fred Christian of Francisco are the owners.
