

N. C. WAREHOUSE SALES REPORT TO OCT. 1, 1941

North Carolina farmers received \$29.41 per hundred pounds for tobacco sold during September compared with \$16.32 for the same month a year ago, according to warehousemen's reports to the State Department of Agriculture. This is an increase of 80 percent or practically double the average price paid during September 1940.

First hand sales for the month, reported at 197,172,013 pounds, are 12 percent above the producers' sales of 175,372,553 pounds for the corresponding month of last season. With both poundage and price up from last year, the value of September sales, reported at \$57,987,126, is 103 percent above the valuation of \$28,618,378 for the same period in 1940.

For the season to October 1, producers have sold 271,614,397 pounds of tobacco for a total of \$77,999,107, an average of \$28.72 per hundred. Last year, to date, growers had sold 202,714,005 lbs. of leaf and received \$32,784,077 or an average of \$16.67 per hundred pounds. The average price paid to date is 72 percent in excess of the average for sales to the same date in 1940.

The percentage of the crop mar-

ketted to date is the highest on record. With a short crop and very favorable prices, growers have sold their tobacco at a rapid rate this year. Some Border Belt markets closed by the middle of September and only a few houses remained open until October 2, the final date of sales for the Belt. Approximately 75 percent of the eastern North Carolina tobacco crop was sold by October 1 compared with 45 percent to this date last year.

Border Belt producers' seasons' sales to October 1, which are practically complete for the year, totaled 61,044,465 pounds compared with 72,790,712 pounds for the entire season last year. Producers have received an average of \$25.99 per hundred compared with \$16.14 for their last year's sales.

Producers' sales on eastern North Carolina markets (Type 12) to October 1 totaled 159,030, 516 pounds compared with 109,640,534 pounds to date a year ago. These markets opened earlier this year than last season. Growers have received an average of \$28.89 for this season or \$12.63 per hundred more than was paid for sales to date last year.

September producers' sales on Type 11 markets totaled 48,539,476 pounds and returned growers an average of \$31.74 per hundred pounds. Last year, these markets
