The funeral was held Monday afternoon at the graveside in the family graveyard, near the home of a grandfather, William Flinchum, Danbury, Route 1.

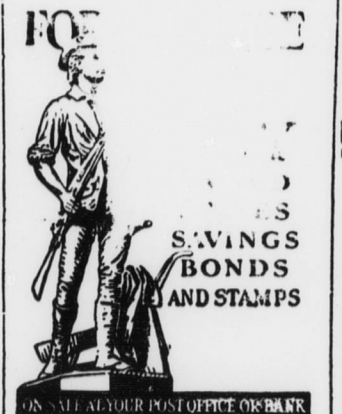

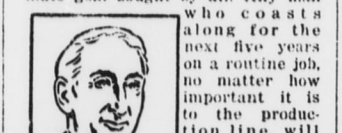

WHERE will the defense worker of today be in five years? That is a question which cannot be answered with any great degree of certainty, but there are well defined steps leading toward the ultimate goal sought by all. Any man who coasts along for the next five years on a routine job, no matter how important it is to the production line, will find himself in no better position than he is today.

It's as true today as it was 100 years ago, that the man who works to get ahead is the man who is improving himself. He is looking far beyond the present job, and in most instances he is studying some type of instruction that will lift him out of a routine job into a position of greater responsibility.

Routine jobs in factories and manufacturing plants, of course, will pay more during the next five years, and they are vital to the nation's defense plans. However, there is danger for the individual, in that he may be content to get along with little thought of advancement. It means that he will have to drive toward the goal even when the future appears dark and uncertain, but some men—those who will finish in the key jobs—will keep plugging away in fair weather and foul. Self-improvement in the face of adversity is typically American. We now have to show that the same progress can be made in times of economic upheaval and abnormal employment demands. Jobs may not be so plentiful five years from now.
