Death Of T. J. Folger Former Danbury Pastor

Thomas J. Folger, aged 58, died at his home at Dobson Saturday. He was a brother of Congressman John H. Folger. Formerly a minister of the gospel, he had to abandon the ministry owing to ill health. He was pastor of the Danbury Methodist Church four years. About 30 years ago.

Mr. Folger was born in Surry county, September 1, 1883, a son of Thomas W. and Ada Dillard Robertson Folger. He spent most of his life around Dobson. He studied for the ministry at one time and was active in religious affairs.

The funeral was held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at Dobson Methodist Church.

Board meetings are held at Danbury each Monday at 2 p. m. February allotment is 14 passenger car tires and 31 truck tires. Only one fourth of these can be issued each Monday, and then only to eligible applicants.

All tire dealers are required to keep all old tires removed when new ones are mounted and all of these old tires should be, if in condition, recapped. The board will ask that each dealer keep it posted on the number and sizes of tires they have recapped and back in stock. In this way many applicants can be taken care of with retreads sufficient to keep them rolling. This cooperation will be mutually advantageous to the dealer, the board and the consumer.

NEW SCHEDULE IN EFFECT 9TH

WELFARE OFFICE STAFF ARRANGES PLAN—VICTORY GARDENS—FREE INOCULATIONS.

Due to the curtailment of tires and the use of automobiles and the fact that Daylight Savings Time takes effect Feb. 9, the Stokes County Welfare Department is rearranging its plans in order to facilitate its effectiveness. The members of the staff will work under the following schedule:

The professional workers, Miss Ella Downing, Miss Nannie Jones and Miss Christine Anderson will be in the office at Danbury every Monday, Wednesday and Friday. On the first and third Tuesdays, Miss Anderson will hold office hours at Reynolds School from 9 until 12 o'clock. On the same Tuesday, Miss Nannie Jones will be at Sandy Ridge. On the second and fourth Tuesdays, Miss Anderson will be at Francisco while Miss Jones will be at Pine Hall. On the first and third Wednesdays from 10 until 12 o'clock, Miss Downing will be at Lawsonville. Each Thursday morning, Miss Anderson will be at the King Health Department, while Miss Jones will be at Walnut Cove.

Persons wishing to contact these workers should make every effort to contact them at the respective places, or come to the office in Danbury during the mornings of the alternating days. The Welfare Department, at the present time, is especially concerned over "Victory Gardens" for every family in Stokes county; and, also, for every family to avail themselves of the free inoculations offered at the Health Department for the prevention of contagious diseases.

The above schedule takes effect February 9, Daylight Savings Time.
