#### MARRIED MEN TO BE CALLED

THOSE WITHOUT CHILDREN WILL BE RECLASSIFIED

Brig. Gen. J. Van B. Metts, state director of selective service, yesterday notified the local draft board in a general bulletin which went out over the state to review all 111-A classifications preparatory to the induction of married men whose wives are working or Russell Watkins, o. c. i. and could become self-supporting driving without Leense, etc., \$50 through employment and where no children are involved.

> Officials were instructed that condit.ons existing now do not, however, warrant the 1-A class fication of registrants who have children dependent upon them, but it was specifically pointed out that "conditions today will not justify deferment of a married man simply because he has a wife.

The oulletin specified that "even though they (registrants) have been married for a number of years, if the wife is self-supporting now or can become self-sup porting within a reasonable time, and children are not involved, the continued classification of the husband in 111-A would not be justified." In determining a status of dependency, board officials were instructed to ascertain whether the wife is "self-supporting."

General Metts said that if the wife does not work and has not worked for the past several years, and there is not sufficient income from sources other than earnings of her husband for support, a true case of dependency "would sem to exist and a classification in 111-A would be proper."
