All men born on or after January 1, 1922, and on or before June 30, 1942 will be required to register in this fifth registration which is to be held June 30, 1942, between the hours of 7:00 a. m. and 9:00 p. m.

Places of registration are the same as on Feb. 16, 1942 and April 27, 1942.

Madison.—William Jackson Bullins, aged 56, of Walnut Cove, Route 2, who was injured May 28 between Walnut Cove and Danbury, in a truck collision, died Sunday morning at 2 o'clock, at a Winston-Salem hospital.

Mrs. Lilly Bullins, who was injured in the same accident, remains in a Winston-Salem hospital, suffering from cuts and bruises.

Officers who investigated the accident, said Bullins was operating a truck en route to Danbury and the machine was in collision with a truck operated by Jesse Brown, Negro, of Sandy Ridge. Brown gave \$1,000 bond for a hearing in connection with the accident.

The Bullins were en route to Danbury where Mrs. Bullins was to have been examined by a physician.

Mr. Bullins is survived by his second wife, Mrs. Lilly Bullins; six sons, Alfred and Johnny Bullins, of Bassett, Va.; Jesse, Emmett, Walter, and William Bullins of Walnut Cove, Route 2; three daughters, Mrs. Claude Morton, and Misses Pauline and Louise Bullins, of Stokes county; two brothers, Luther Bullins, of Durham, and Banner Bullins, of Stokes county; and two sisters, Mrs. Ada Mitchell, of Stokes county, and Miss Sarah Bullins, of Virginia.

The funeral was held Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock at Bethesda Methodist Church, Stokes county. Burial was in the church graveyard.

Joe W. Kington Dies Monday

Madison.—Joe W. Kington, aged 84, Stokes county farmer, died Monday afternoon in a Winston-Salem hospital following a three weeks' illness.
