Mrs. Cromer was charged with burning the barn and stable of W. G. Ferguson July 29, 1941.

Tracks leading to the scene were identified as those of the defendant, according to evidence introduced into court. She admitted the tracks were hers, according to Justice Barnhill, who wrote the supreme court decision, and stated that she had gone the night before to notify her son that he would have to go to work one hour earlier the next morning due to the change in time.

Justice Barnhill wrote that there was no evidence tending to show the cause or origin of the fire, that there was no evidence that the fire was incendiary and not sufficient testimony tending to incriminate the defendant.

According to the evidence, Mrs. Cromer owned two farms. Her sons were curing tobacco on one farm and in making the trip on foot to the barn on the morning in question she had to pass close by the tobacco barn on the property of Ferguson. The tobacco barn and stable were partially burned, it is understood, before the flame was extinguished but later in the day lightning struck the barn and completed the destruction.

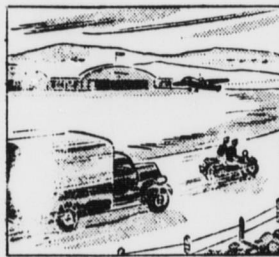
One War Week
