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## GET READY FOR FOOD RATIONING

Stokes Rationing Board Issues Information On Point Rationing That Starts In February.

Mrs. D. C. Kirby outlines coming process:

Point rationing will start in February for canned, bottled and frozen fruits, vegetables and juices, dried fruits and soups.

Announced now because food industry and public must learn system before operation starts.

Boards will be main source of accurate information on system.

These are the steps:

1. Rationing will be preceded by short freeze so that retailers can stock up and make ready.
2. During freeze every man, woman and child will be issued War Ration Book 2.
3. The blue stamps in Book 2 are for processed food.
4. The letter of the alphabet on the stamp indicates when it is good.
5. The number on the stamp indicates its point value.
6. Every man, woman and child will receive the same number of points less deduction for excess stocks.
7. It will take both money and points to buy rationed foods.
8. You can choose what you want to buy with your points.

No justification for hoarding. All rationed food except home canned you own will have to be declared before getting a ration book, and stamps will be deducted by boards.

You won't have to declare home canned foods. Encourage home canning.

A list of canned foods to be rationed will be sent you soon.

Boards will have help. It will take a million and a half volunteers to handle registration. But many organizations are going to help.

Remember food is important in war strategy. A soldier eats twenty per cent. more than a civilian. Our men in Africa had to have 100 days emergency food supply. The Russian Armies are winning with American foods.

Point rationing guarantees everyone at home his fair share of rationing foods.

## Glenn Morefield Kills Self Near Walnut Cove

Leaving a note to his father, that "I had rather be dead than to think about going back and leaving you here with all the work to do," Private Glenn M. Morefield, 20, of Walnut Cove shot himself through the heart with a double barreled shotgun Tuesday afternoon at his home near Walnut Cove.

Morefield had come home Friday from Camp Breckenridge, Ky., to spend a Christmas furlough with his family. He was to have returned to camp Wednesday.

Tuesday afternoon, he and his family were to have gone to the home of his sister, Mrs. Robert Joyce in Walnut Cove for dinner, but Glenn said that he did not feel like going and stayed home. His father left him lying down at home. When he returned shortly after dark, he found his son shot through the heart. The body was in a small outer building that had been living quarters for a colored boy employed on the place. The boy was not there at the time.

The young man had apparently propped the gun against the wall of the building and pulled the trigger with a stick.

A note in the boy's pocket to his father showed his intent to shoot himself. The note read:

"I know this is the wrong thing to do, but I had rather be dead than to think about going back and leaving you here with all the work to do.

Morefield was drafted into the army several months ago. The shooting was investigated by Deputies Carl Ray and Burke Smith.

It was not known just what time the shooting occurred, but the suicide was believed to have taken place late in the afternoon.

Private Morefield is survived by his father, G. H. Morefield, five brothers, Harry Morefield of High Point, Rob Morefield and Charley Morefield of Walnut Cove, Bruce Morefield of Walkertown, George Morefield of Knob, Key West, Florida; five sisters, Mrs. Rob Joyce, Mrs. Trula Tuttle of Walnut Cove, Miss Clarice Morefield of Pilot Mountain, Mrs. J. T. Skipper, Miss Ruth Morefield, Walnut Cove.
