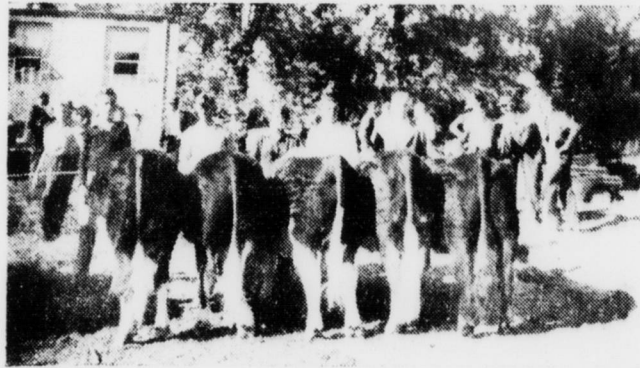


FEEDERS EXHIBIT GOOD CATTLE

showmanship contest and was fourth. The five calves in the lower picture were fourth in this contest.

Each of the calf owners cleared from \$50 to \$75 on each calf. Junior Grabbs of King had the best record from Stokes county. His calf and feed cost \$130 and the calf sold for \$197. Including the prize money Junior cleared \$73 on his calf. This is indeed a good record.

The seven calves sold at Elkin averaged 22 1/2 a pound on foot. They sold for a total of \$1340.15. Another calf was sold locally by Wm. Gentry, King, for \$128. The total beef sales for 4-H and FFA calves was \$1468.00. All of the calves were largely under the supervision of S. B. Brandon, Vocational Agriculture Teacher, King.

Such records as these are typical of what Stokes county boys and girls are doing. The only thing they need is the support of their parents and local county citizens.

Roger began his agricultural career at the age of 10. He has raised poultry since the age of 10. He has been a 4-H Club member and in 1941 he began taking Agriculture in the King High School under the supervision of S. B. Brandon, Vocational Agriculture Teacher. Under Mr. Brandon's supervision he has been one of his best FSA students.

In the early part of 1941, Roger purchased a grade Jersey cow and began selling butter. In 1942 he purchased a registered Jersey heifer and in 1943 he bought another registered Jersey that dropped a heifer calf in that fall. At the promotional sale held at Danbury last spring he bought another registered Jersey cow. Since that time he has been selling milk on the local milk route. When inducted he was getting around \$70 a month for the milk from his three cows. Roger states that his registered Jerseys are worth \$775. Since the beginning of Roger's agricultural work he has carried a poultry project. For the past four years he has kept 200 to 400 layers each year and sells hatching eggs to a local hatchery. This year his layers came from the famous Christie Poultry Farm in New Hampshire. Roger mates his hens with ROP roosters. Each year he markets several hundred broilers. Not only does Roger own 400 laying hens this year but the poultry houses are also his. The houses and extension to er purchased a grade Jersey cow dairy barn are valued at \$575.00. The poultry is worth \$600. and he purchased a registered Jersey the dairy cattle, \$775. This gives him a total farm value of \$1975.00. Along the lines of honor, Roger has been outstanding. In 1941 he

attended the 4-H short course at Raleigh. Last year he was seventh place in the egg laying contest sponsored by the North Carolina Bankers Association. In 1944 he won a blue and a white ribbon at the Piedmont Junior Dairy Show sponsored by Coble Dairy Products Co. This year he won two blue ribbons.

When Roger returns from the army he plans to pick up, carry on and expand his farming activities. His parents and brother are caring for his poultry and dairy cattle while he is in service.
