NEXT BIG BOND CAMPAIGN BEGINS

IT STARTS MONDAY, NOV. 20— HARVEY JOHNSON IS CHM —STOKES QUOTA IS \$96,000

Harvey G. Johnson of German ton is the chairman of the next big war bond campaign which begins Monday, Nov. 20.

The county's quota is \$96,000. Mr. Johnson was here Wednesday looking after some of the details of his organization which will be announced in the next issue of the Reporter.

Stokes county has never yet failed in its quotas in past campaigns. It will not fail this one. The war is now in its critical stages. Billions of dollars are required to keep the vast program for victory going.

William F., son of Supt. and Mrs. H. P. Loftis of the Stokes County Home, was a gunner on the aircraft carrier Princeton which was sunk by the Japs near the Philippines in the great sea fight of Oct. 25. More than 1400 of the vessel's crew were saved, but about 140 were lost. William was among the rescued and is now recuperating from wounds in a base hospital, probably at Pearl Harbor.
