## A WORD IN TIME.

From present indications it begins now to look as though application would be made to the next Legislature for authority to extend the corporate limits of the town of Durham. We heard one party high in the councils of democracy express himself in favor of extending these limits to include one mile from the depot each waymaking the town four times its present size. We do not reply to this matter to make any unfavorable comments uron this scheme nor to express any opinion thereupon: it ought not to take on a political aspect. We only refer to it that the people may be forewarned and put in possession of this information in ample time to take such action as they deem best. We are satisfied however that in any event it is not intended that the town if extended shall be left so that by any human possibility the Republican Party can control it, or that any true democratic system of representation will be permited. It is not worti while to place any confidence in Bourbon promise of fair play in this matter. Such promises are easily evaded and given a strained construction. There is not to-day in all the State of North Carolina a single town of any size under republican rule, nor do the Bourbons intend there shall be, so long as "jerrymandering'" can be used to prevent it.
