## TO SPEAK IN INDIANA ONLY

### Ex-President Harrison's Reply to Mr. Tanner.

### HE DECLINES TO ACCEPT

### An Invitation from Mr. Tanner to Speak in Illinois.

United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners' Meeting in Annual Session at Indianapolis, Ind.—They Are Welcomed by Several Distinguished State and Labor Speakers.

WASHINGTON, September 19.—Chairman Tanner of the republican state committee of Illinois, wrote recently to ex-President Harrison asking him to make one or more campaign speeches in Illinois this fall. He has received the following reply:

Indianapolis, Ind., September 13, 1894.—John R. Tanner.

My Dear Sir: I have not been able sooner to acknowledge your letter of August 22. I only got home yesterday. I have made up my mind not to go out of this state to enter into the campaign this fall. I do not think it would be right for me to go into general campaign work. I have promised our own people to make a couple of short speeches in this state, and if I go beyond this and visit Illinois or Iowa, as I have been invited to do, or any other state, I could not put any limit on the demands which would be made upon me. I am sorry to disappoint you, for you have all shown me a great deal of kindness in the past.

### IN ANNUAL SESSION.

United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners' Meeting at Indianapolis.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., September 19.—The eighth general convention of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America began its annual session in this city yesterday, in the state capitol. About seventy-five delegates were present, representing 641 local unions. Governor Matthews welcomed the delegates for the state and was followed by W. B. Prescott, president of the International Typographical Union, who welcomed the delegates in behalf of organized labor. Henry Gale also spoke of the local unions. A reception will be tendered the delegates tonight. The convention will remain in session several days, and will consider many questions of importance to the order.

### ALASKA TO HAVE A CONVENTION

On November 5th, the Citizens Will Consider How to Influence Congress.

VIctoria, B. C., September 19.—The steamer the City of Topeka, from Alaska brings news of a mass meeting August 31 to consider the need of a code of laws to govern this vast domain and the necessity of the establishment of a mail route into the Yukon country by way of Chilkat Pass.

Resolutions were adopted providing for a convention of the people of Alaska to be held at Juneau, November 5th, to consider the best means of securing remedial legislation by congress. Each town and settlement will be entitled to representation by delegates, the total number provided for being 119. The election of delegates will be held October 6th.

### SUGAR TRUST WITNESSES.

Indictments Expected to be Returned Against Havemeyer and Others.

WASHINGTON, September 19.—When the grand jury present their next batch of indictments, it is understood that indictments against Henry O. Havemeyer, John E. Searles and Allen L. Seymour of the firm of Seymour Bros., Young of New York will be presented. The parties were witnesses before the senate investigating committee in the matter of the alleged sugar bribery cases and are said to have answered certain inquiries propounded to them by the committee. As stated several days ago, the cases in the matter have been exposed recently by the grand jury and it is understood that indictments against the above named parties have been determined upon by the grand jury.

### DESTROYED BY THIEVES.

The Circuit Court Records Torn Into Fragments at Owensboro, Ky.

OWENSBORO, Ky., September 19.—Either Sunday or Monday night thieves entered the circuit court room at the courthouse and played havoc with the clerk's records. Every indictment found at the recent term of court was stolen and torn to fragments. The pieces were found scattered around in all parts of the courthouse yard. The clerk's large order book was mutilated and destroyed so as to be worthless, and the clerk will be greatly inconvenienced. Judge Owen is not here, and it is not known what method will be adopted for restoring the records. The police are all at work on the case.

### TO GOVERNOR'S ISLAND.

Gen. Miles Will be Transferred Early in November.

On the 19th, September 19.—It was definitely announced yesterday that General Nelson A. Miles will be transferred to Governor's Island upon the retirement of General Howard, which occurs November 1. It is thought that General Ringer, of San Francisco, will succeed General Miles as major general in command of the Missouri.
