

THE VOTERS ARE STIRRED

Campaign Hot in the Old Dominion.

MANY PERSONAL FIGHTS

Statements Made and Denied with Bitterness.

Joint Discussions Never Before so Numerous in Virginia Campaign—Relief Recommended for the Settlers of the Districts Recently Burned—Myers Held in the First Degree.

RICHMOND, Va., September 28.—The campaign in this state is becoming alarmingly hot. Two personal encounters between congressional delegates have occurred this week, and it is feared that bloodshed will result before the end of the canvass. The first of these occurred at Livingston, Nelson county, in the tenth district, between Representative Henry St. Geo. Tucker and his republican opponent, Mr. Jacob Yost.

During a joint discussion between the two a question of veracity arose between Tucker and Yost, when the former promptly called the latter a liar. Mr. Yost struck at Mr. Tucker, but Myers interfered and prevented further trouble.

The second difficulty occurred yesterday at King William court house in this (the third) district, where Colonel Tazewell Elliott, the democratic nominee, attacked Judge J. W. Gregory, his populist opponent. The colonel stated that Judge Gregory repudiated the Omaha platform of his party now, but that he had accepted and claimed to stand upon it in his speech at New Kent court house.

Judge Gregory, in a manner very vehement and aggressive, denied this. Colonel Elliott asked if his denial in such flat terms implied that he (Elliott) was making an untrue statement, or something to that effect.

Judge Gregory's reply was construed by Colonel Elliott to be insulting, and he kicked him.

Friends soon interfered, and further disturbance was avoided. Joint discussions were never before so numerous in a Virginia campaign, and the voters are wrought up to a high pitch of excitement.

SAYS CONGRESS SHOULD ACT.

Relief Recommended for the Settlers of the Burned Districts.

WASHINGTON, September 28.—Commissioner Lamoreux of the general land office has decided to embody in his annual report a recommendation that congress should immediately take some action for the relief of the settlers on homesteads in the burned districts of Wisconsin and Minnesota. The commissioner says that he can find no law which will authorize the department to grant the settler permission to cut the burned timber on their homesteads, yet he is enough of a practical lumberman to know that this timber must be cut this winter in order to save it. The commissioner believes that congress will act promptly and that the homesteaders will be authorized to cut the timber this coming winter.

MYERS HELD IN FIRST DEGREE.

Grand Jury Regards the Atlanta Assassin as the Sole Slayer of Forrest Crowley.

ATLANTA, September 28.—William J. Myers, against whom the brutal murder of young Forrest Crowley is charged, has been indicted for the crime, the bill of indictment being for murder in the first degree. The grand jury returned the bill yesterday in three hours after hearing the case. The same witnesses testified as before the coroner's jury, and the decision was reached immediately upon the close of the testimony.

The detectives are still working upon the clues which associate Myers' name with other crimes, but have made as yet no really convincing discovery in that particular.

DECLINES AN EMPTY HONOR.

But Because His Personal Friend Was the Opponent.

RICHMOND, Va., September 28.—Mr. H. B. Jones, who was named by the Republicans last Thursday for congress in this (the third) district published a card yesterday afternoon declining the nomination. Mr. Jones assigns as his reason for the declination that he has always affiliated with the democratic party, and now that his warm personal friend, Colonel Tazewell Elliott, is its nominee, he feels in duty bound to support him.

SOUTHERN COTTON MARKETS.

Spot Declines an Eighth at New Orleans. Savannah, Norfolk and Baltimore.

New York, September 28.—The Sun's cotton review says: Cotton declined twelve to fourteen points and closed easy. Spot cotton here was 1-16 lower. There was a decline of 1-16 at Mobile and St. Louis and 1-8 at Savannah, New Orleans, Norfolk, Baltimore and Memphis. Charleston advanced 1-16. New Orleans receipts today are estimated at 3,000, possibly 4,000, against 2,728 on the same day last week and 5,550 last year.

The Southern's Report for July.

New York, Sept. 27.—The Southern Railway company reports, for July, gross earnings of \$678,125, an increase of \$7,880; expenses and taxes \$494,489, a decrease of \$95,520, and net \$183,636, an increase of \$103,400.

North Carolina Has Third Place.

In the report of new industries for the past three months by the Tradesman at Chattanooga, North Carolina is third with 47, Georgia having 55 and Texas 64. North Carolina has 7 new cotton mill industries, Georgia being two ahead of her.

GRAHAM-SETTLE.

They Had a Full House This Evening at the Court House.

Hon. A. W. Graham at the appointed time today was escorted to the court house by a large delegation of citizens. The Durham band headed the procession which was followed by the young men's democratic club headed by Mr. Graham arm in arm with J. S. Manning and T. H. Martin.

Hon. Tom Settle was escorted to the court house by one who all know, Mr. Washington Duke.

Mr. Settle opened the debate at 1:45 and delivered an able address to the crowd that was present. He said it was his pleasure to announce himself a candidate for congress on the republican ticket.

Hon. A. W. Graham taken his opponent's place at 2:45, and in his remarks he said he didn't know how to express himself towards his people for the hearty welcome they gave.

About three hundred or more thronged the street to see him and escort him to his appointed place.

After they entered the court room the band formed a circle and there disposed of some of their music in the brightest tunes in behalf of the Hon. A. W. Graham.

All those that wished to hear the debate could not find room in the court house. Every seat was occupied by a listener, and all the aisles from the platform to the main entrance of the court room.

At the time of going to press loud cheers were going up from both sides.

FULLER ACQUITTED.

The Jury Returned a Verdict of Not Guilty.

ROCKINGHAM, N. C., Sept. 27.—Solicitor McNeill made the closing speech in the Fuller trial this morning, which was an argument worth listening to. The court house was crowded to overflowing. Upon the closing of the speech, the judge delivered an impartial charge to the jury. But owing to some oversight of a technical point, a second charge was delivered and the jury retired, remaining out about fifteen or twenty minutes, after which a verdict of not guilty was returned.

WILMINGTON, N. C., Sept. 27.—A special to the Star says: The trial of Edward J. Fuller, which has been progressing at Rockingham, Richmond county, nearly six days, ended today with a verdict of acquittal.

Fuller was charged with the murder of B. C. Parker, of Fayetteville, N. C., and was tried there last March, convicted of murder in the first degree, and sentenced to be hanged.

The case was taken to supreme court which granted a new trial. Change of venue was then made to Richmond county, and second trial resulted in prompt acquittal.

The case has attracted much attention throughout the state.
