Proceedings in the Senate and House Yesterday.

WASHINGTON, June 29.—SENATE.—Among the bills reported from committees and placed on the calendar...

The discussion of the bill, after continuing for three hours, was interrupted in order to let other business be transacted.

The committee appointed by the National Committee to provide headquarters, consisting of Barnum (chairman), Dawson and Oelrichs have this day selected the house No. 10, West 29th street as such headquarters.

A Mother's Crime. Special to the News & Observer. CAMELON, N. C., June 29.—TOWN Marshal Charles Stone, of Keyser, passed through here this morning en route to Carthage, having in charge Cassie Douglass (col.), who, to-day one week ago, killed her infant daughter, who was three years old.

Mr. Clements, of Georgia, reported that the conference committee on the district of Columbia appropriation bill had failed to agree and stated that the chief point of difference between the two houses grew out of increased appropriations made by the Senate for paving streets.

Motions to strike from the free list trags of whatsoever material composed, and "reeds manufactured but not made into finished articles," were rejected.

On motion of Mr. Breckenridge, of Arkansas, paintings in oil or water colors, and stationery not otherwise provided for, were stricken from the free list.

Mr. Lehlbach, of New Jersey, moved to strike from the free list stones, unmanufactured or undressed free stone, granite, sandstone and all building and monumental stone.

Mr. Baker, of New York, moved to add photographic print paper not albumenized or sensitized to the free list.

Mr. Buchanan offered an amendment providing that when any of the articles named in the first section (the free list) are imported in vessels of foreign registry, they shall pay the duties imposed by the act of 1883.

Mr. Russell, of Massachusetts, moved to place primaline on the free list. He stated that it was a dye used in the manufacture of cotton goods, and that it was not produced in this country. The motion was agreed to.

This completed the consideration of the free list section, and the clerk proceeded to read the dutiable portion of the bill. The clause providing that the change in the rate of duties shall take effect July 1st, 1888, was passed over informally.

Mr. Adams, of Illinois, moved to strike out the clause fixing the rate of duty on refined glycerine at 3 cents a pound. This led to a long discussion, in the course of which Mr. Reed, of Maine, bitterly criticized the majority of the Ways and Means committee for attempting to withhold the country by statements made as to the effect the bill would have upon the revenues.

Mr. Wilson, of West Virginia, and Mr. Breckenridge, of Arkansas, took up the cudgels in defence of the Ways and Means committee and in the counter attack upon the minority of that committee a good part of the debate was devoted to a heated personal controversy between Messrs. Breckenridge and Reed. Finally Mr. Adams' amendment was rejected.

The committee then rose. The House concurred in the Senate amendment to the joint resolution extending appropriations for thirty days, and at 5 p. m. took a recess until 8 o'clock, the evening session to be for the consideration of private pension bills.

Stabbed to Death.

St. Louis, June 29.—A special to the Post-Dispatch from Memphis says: Thomas Moorhead, an old citizen, was stabbed six times by Thos. Taylor, a young man, last night, and died this morning. The trouble was over the elopement of Moorhead's daughter with Taylor, the old man compelling the girl to return home. On meeting the old man Taylor attacked him with the result stated.

A Hung Jury.

St. Louis, June 29.—A special from Parsons, Kansas, says: The coroner's jury impaneled at Chetopa yesterday morning to inquire into the lynching of two colored men by a mob of Chetopa citizens yesterday is composed of four white and eight colored citizens. The white jurors insist that the verdict should say that "the lynched men came to their death by violence at the hands of parties unknown," while the colored jurors say that the names of over one hundred of the mob are known and want a verdict to charge them with the crime and refuse to consent to a verdict otherwise.

The Harbor at Tampa.

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Senator Vest to-day presented a petition from the Merchants' Exchanges of St. Louis, Chicago, Cincinnati, Louisville, Nashville, Chattanooga, Atlanta and Tampa asking an appropriation for the improvement of the harbor at Tampa, Fla. The petitioners represent that the improvement of this harbor would be of immense value to the South and West, as it would enable goods to be shipped to Cuba and South America via Tampa and thus greatly shorten the distance over which they have to be transported.

News & Observer: The Governor yesterday pardoned Aaron Rooker who was convicted at the December term of 1887 of Mecklenburg Criminal Court of the larceny of one dollar's worth of provisions and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. The pardon was granted on the certificate of the county superintendent of health, the solicitor and the judge that the prisoner was very low with typhoid fever and his life was believed to be dependent upon his release.
