FROM WASHINGTON.

Our Zeb Hits the Republican Tariff Framers—The Old Roman at the Capital—The Appropriations.

SPECIAL TO THE PLANT.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 9—2:20 p. m.—Senator Vance has just made a splendid hit in the Senate at the framers of the Republican tariff report. He leaves to-night for Durham and Warrenton.
Judge Thurman is now making the opening speech in the Supreme court room on the celebrated Bell telephone case. He looks well.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 9—2:25 p. m.—The last of the appropriation measure ready to-day and which will probably pass before night, makes the total expenditures of the government for the present fiscal year, four hundred and twenty-two million dollars; receipts, four hundred and forty millions; something less than eighteen millions surplus. The appropriation committee, after the recent expose, cut down remaining bills as much as possible. The above amount does not include the surplus of former years, nor the surplus kept for account of the sinking fund. Senator Vance goes out to-night, speaking at Warrenton to-morrow and Durham Thursday.
