

Brooklyn Frightened Over a Fatal Case of Yellow Fever.

New York, Oct. 26.—Considerable alarm has been occasioned over the death in St. John's Hospital, in Brooklyn, of Capt. John Gillard, of the steamer Carenz, of yellow fever. Health authorities, however, assure that there is no cause for fear, and that everything possible to prevent the spread of the disease has been done. The steamer Carenz was immediately returned to the lower quarantine, and she will be thoroughly fumigated. A portion of her cargo, which was discharged at Martin's stores, was also disinfected. Some trouble was experienced in finding out the identity of the sick captain, who was not until after other persons had hired the vessel could be found. The vessel was thoroughly disinfected and the crew are now at work trying to locate the several passengers. The body of the captain, after being placed in an air-tight casket, was taken to Evergreen Cemetery for burial. Portions of the body had been retained by the doctors and will be subjected to microscopic examination for scientific purposes in more determining the diagnosis of the disease. Part of the ship's cargo was shipped east will be looked over by the health authorities, they being informed of the matter, that proper precautions can be taken.

Tallentire, General manager of the Wash Railway, was yesterday convicted of murder in the second degree at Keytesville for killing a telegraph operator named C. P. Tydd a year ago and sentenced to 21 years in the penitentiary.

The Works of the Gallows.

St. Louis, W. T., Oct. 26.—Ben F. Carter was hanged at 11 o'clock to-day. At his request newspaper reporters were not present at the execution. Carter walked to the scaffold unsupported. His last words were: "I am going to leave you; will you again. Good-bye." His death was broken by the fall and was instantaneous.

Floquet's Proposal.

St. Louis, Oct. 26.—At a meeting to-day of the Republican Left of the city it was shown that a majority of the members of the Senate were opposed to Floquet's proposal for a revision of the Constitution. They favor the scheme to be fraught with danger to the Parliamentary system, and at the same time to the detriment of the Executive.

Hanged for Murder.

St. Louis, Oct. 26.—Hugh Blacklock of California, was hanged at 10 o'clock to-day. Blacklock was a negro known as "Big Sid" in the city over a game of crop-over a year ago.
