News from the Capital.

Special Correspondence to THE PLANT.

RALEIGH, N. C., Nov. 8, '88.

The returns from 572 of the 1,100 precincts in the State up to midnight last night gave Cleveland 384 gain over his vote in 1884. He is, as far as can be judged, running ahead of the State ticket.

Some bad news came in just after midnight. There was an intimation, half an hour earlier, that the Democrats had lost the 9th district. A special from Asheville confirmed it and stated that there was scarcely a doubt of Johnston's defeat. It was thought some time ago that that district was doubtful, but ten days ago it appeared that Johnston would win by 500 or 600.

In that far western part of the State news of Eaves "reliables" and Pinkerton "detectives" did not penetrate thoroughly. That news would have changed the result.

Mingled with the pure and undiluted joy at Nichols' defeat is sorrow of that at Johnston and Morehead, for the latter appears to be assumed as a fact.

It looks as if Skinner is all right in the first district, but returns are certainly scarce. That remark also applies to the second district as well, for no one here knows whether Chatham or Simmons is the winner. As Mabson's vote is so very light, Simmons has a great deal to overcome, but as far as known he has done splendidly.

Official reports show that the Legislature is Democratic and with a good margin—19 in the Senate and 14 in the House; at the very least. In this calculation the Democrats are given the doubtful counties.

Full official returns show that the Democrats carry the counties of Alexander, Anson, Beaufort, Brunswick, Burke, Buncombe, Catawba, Chatham, Cleveland, Cumberland, Duplin, Durham, Franklin, Halifax, Harnett, Haywood, Hertford, Iredell, Jackson, Lincoln, McDowell, Mecklenburg, Moore, Nash, Orange, Pamlico, Pitt, Rockingham, Rowan, Rutherford, Stokes, Swain, Yancey, Wilson, Macon, Clay, Graham and Transylvania.—38.

The same class of returns show that the Republicans have carried Davie, Granville, Greene, Guilford, Madison, Northampton, Polk, Randolph, Washington, Watauga, Yadkin, Mitchell, Henderson and Cherokee.—14.

All the interest yesterday was in the Cleveland vote, in New York. Chairman Brice telegraphed here that he refused to acknowledge Cleveland's defeat. Mr. John C. Reid, managing editor of the New York Times, telegraphed Mr. Spier Whitaker that Harrison had carried New York by 5,000 or more. This pretty well settled matters.

Deep as the excitement has been here, there have been fewer outward and visible signs of it than ever before. There has been no cheering, no turbulence among the colored people, no threats of violence of any sort. Four years ago a great riot was narrowly escaped; this year the contrast was happy.

Very few people here knew of the impending troubles at Durham, but those who were aware of them had no sort of doubt of the ability of the Durham people to suppress them. There need be no fears of rioting in North Carolina. The troops are in shape for ready assemblage always. They are all on lines of railway and telegraphic communication and rioters can speedily be crushed.

The end of the beautiful, but most unseasonably warm weather is greeted with pleasure. Rain began falling last night.

Governor Scales has respited Millie Potat (the negro woman who was to have been hanged at Yanceyville to-morrow), until December 7th. Arson was her crime.

Governor Scales will go to Greensboro to-morrow.

There were the most conflicting claims about Wake county yesterday. It was said late last night that the Democrats had elected all their legislative and county ticket, save Capt. Mack Page.

It is expected that in a few days the counsel of Cross and White will attempt to get their case before the U. S. Supreme court, in a writ of error.
