



**SUMMARY.**  
 A serious riot occurred at Augusta, Ga., opened by the white men against the negroes.—A train wrecked in Georgia day before yesterday resulted in the killing of five and the wounding of twelve others.—McPherson, of the Republican Committee, says his party carried twelve in the House of Representatives; he also thinks the legislature of West Virginia will be Republican, and that a United States Senator, who was hung by masked men in Michigan, will be a Democrat.—It looks as if the white men of North Carolina had taken a part at least of the advice Senator Vance gave them during the campaign, which was: "Say your prayers, obey your wives and vote the Democratic ticket."  
 The Wilmington Star says Dr. Porter, at Jacksonville, Fla., reports to the Marine Hospital Service that there were forty-seven new cases of yellow fever and one death yesterday, making the total number of cases to date 4,355, and the deaths 367.

**Messrs. Mangum and Others.**  
 We are pleased to be able to comment the action of Messrs. D. C. Mangum, W. A. Albright and C. G. Ross during the excitement which we have had for several days since the election. They have not fomented strife, but have assisted the white people in discouraging lawlessness and disorder among the blacks. Their conduct has been that of good citizens, and in striking contrast with the behavior of some other white Republicans.  
**Raised Several Notches.**  
 From a lengthy correspondence in the North Carolina Presbyterian, upon Sam Jones, we extract the following: "What effect did hearing Jones preach have on my previous estimate of him? It raised my estimate several notches. In the meagre reports of his sermons in the newspaper one can detect no evidence of spiritual power—no evidence of anything calculated to produce spiritual effects. The impression one gets from reading newspaper accounts is that Jones is a novel combination of impudence, coarseness and wagsness. No one can listen long and attentively without the conviction that Sam Jones has felt the power of the Gospel in his own heart, and ardently desires that others should feel it. When he talks about man, whether concerning his sins or his duties, he gives reins to wit, to ridicule, to sarcasm; but when he talks about Christ his voice takes on the mellow accents of love."

**FROM WASHINGTON.**  
**Election of Harrison Conceded by The Democratic National Executive Committee.**  
 SPECIAL TO THE PLANT.  
 The following telegram from our special Washington correspondent was received last night:  
 WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—The National Democratic Executive Committee concedes Harrison's election. The Republicans carried California by from five to ten thousand, Indiana, from three to four thousand. West Virginia is still in doubt; it will probably require the official count to decide the result in this State. Virginia is Democratic. The representatives in the next Congress will be very close. The indications are that the Republicans will have a small majority.  
 Full unofficial returns from New York place Harrison's plurality at about 12,000. The plurality of Hill, Democrat, for Governor, will exceed this.  
 The Evening Post states that the electoral vote stands, Harrison, 233; Cleveland, 168.  
 The indications are that the Republicans have a majority in the legislature in West Virginia and in Delaware, which will give the Republican party two additional United States Senators.

 In the last "Year Book of the Young Men's Christian Associations, 1882," it was shown that sixty-nine Associations had practically tested the advantages of owning their homes; and the testimony of nearly one-half of these has been placed before me. The exhibit is very interesting and very conclusive.  
 Time will permit me to make a very limited use of these interesting and valuable letters:  
 "Its young men's meetings are much improved, and there is greater interest in every department."  
 "Lectures formerly a failure—now a success. Attendance at the reading room quadrupled. Formerly raised \$600 per annum; now raised \$2,000."  
 "We get more new members, and are on an enviable financial footing;" comes from another city.  
 "In all religious work," writes a secretary, "the growth has been marked; for example, the attendance at the Sunday afternoon meeting in 1877 was fifty-five. It is now four hundred. Before entering the building, there was no gymnasium, no evening classes, very little social work, and reading room attendance about one-third of present attendance."  
 "I doubt if we should be in existence to-day if we had not a building," writes the president of another Association.  
 In a city of 20,000, the president writes: "Our membership has increased in the ten years we have had our building, from two hundred to five hundred, and that is about the ratio of increase in every branch of our work. The city itself meantime has neither increased in population or wealth."
