

Horrible Murder in Cleveland County.

Special to the News and Observer. CLEVELAND, N. C., Nov. 22.—The most horrible and cold-blooded murder committed last night shortly after dark. James Philbeck, a farmer and industrious farmer, 60 years old, who lives four miles west of Shelby, was called to his back door by a man who said he had a friend and was shot in the most cold-blooded way, falling entering his right nostril the other the roof of the mouth. The man who had followed him to the door, was compelled to surrender the money she had—a ten dollar bill and about three dollars more. The burglar then cursed and said she had more, as her husband had just sold seven bales of cotton. She offered him the money and said he could search the house and that she would strike a match if the wind coming from the door having extinguished the light. As she struck a match the burglar put a pistol to her face and fired under the left eye, the ball striking downward, and then he fled. Mrs. Philbeck was unconscious for about half an hour, with a great effort she made her way to the house of Perry Lovelace, her brother-in-law, about fifty yards away. The latter heard the sound of the shot, but thought Philbeck was unwell. He at once summoned assistance, but the murderer made his escape, leaving no clue behind him. Mrs. Philbeck cannot identify the man, but says she thinks he is either a white man or a mulatto. He was evading acquaintance with the premises. Philbeck and wife lived alone, their children having married or being at school. Sheriff Hamrick, with a posse, is in search of the murderer, but has no clue. The people of the county are greatly excited over the murder and if the man were caught he would be lynched. The murder was alone.

The Fever at Fernandina.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 22.—General Hamilton has received the following telegram from Fernandina, Florida: "One new case of yellow fever reported for the twenty-four hours ending p. m. November 20. A careful study of the status shows four cases of yellow fever under treatment at Fernandina yesterday. On no account my arrival here has the number of cases under treatment been so small as yesterday. Yellow fever pabulum is about checked."

The National Grange.

WHEELING, W. Va., Nov. 22.—At the closing of the National Grange, Col. J. B. Brigham, of Ohio, was elected Grand Master, and Leonard Rhone, of Pennsylvania, was selected to fill the vacancy on the executive committee. A resolution urging that U. S. Senators be elected directly by the people was passed, as was also a resolution advocating pure food. The meeting adjourned, leaving the matter of the next meeting place to the next executive committee.

Carolina Wins First Prize.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Nov. 22.—The feature of the Danville Tobacco Exposition to-day was the award of premiums on tobacco exports. The first premium on bright tobacco goes to Madison county. The premiums all totalled \$2,150. The inter-State prize drill the Danville Blues took the first prize in the Reidsville, N. C., Light Infantry the second.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Indian Commissioner Obery to-day received a letter from Robt. L. Owen, Indian Agent at Muscogee, Indian Territory, denying the truth of a report of a disturbance in the Chickasaw Nation over the election of a governor of that nation.
