The Code Duello-How Would

Special Correspondence to The Plant.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 22.—The Blackburn vs. Rucker controversy may end in a duel, so the quid nuncs here say. The casus belli is a question of veracity between Senator Joe Blackburn and Judge Bucker about an alleged statement made by the President. Colonel Clarke, of this city, is the possessor of a genuine copy of the "Code Duello" and some of the newspaper men have been consulting the code to know whether there will be a fight. Colonel Clarke, who is a Kentuckian, a friend of Blackburn, and who is au fait on all that pertains to the code, intimates that the affair ealls for a challenge! The quarrel is an unusually and rediculous one, and men who quarrel in this way are seldom brave enough to follow even the code, and this is not the highest type of courage by a great deal. There has been too much bluster about it for many black eyes or bullet holes to be the result.

Ex-Judge Thomas Settle is at the Ebbitt.
