The English Leave New York in Numbers.

New York, Nov. 24.—This is Evacuation Day and the English are going with a vengeance. Lord Sackville West, late British Minister at Washington, has already taken his departure. His daughters, who entered themselves to the people of Washington, accompanied him. Mr. Chamberlain, of Fisheries, has gone and taken with him his young American bride. A. S. Northcote also took his departure, with others more or less mentioned in the annals of English fame. Thomas M. Waller, Consul General to London, sailed on a steamer, presumably to show that American feelings prevailed over prejudice for the others that were of circumstances compelled to leave. On board the French steamer La Bourgoyne, in addition to Lord Sackville West and Victoria and Amelia and Mr. Chamberlain, were Admiral H. Usher, U. S. N., and Mrs. Sackville West and Mr. and Mrs. Chamberlain went on board the steamer last night. Mr. Chamberlain was ostentatiously followed, or accompanied, by a detective. Chamberlain declined to be interviewed, and the most unobscuring observer in the profession was present. The prominent Englishmen who left to-day kept strictly to the seclusion of their staterooms and positively declined to be interviewed.

Valparaiso, Nebraska, Bank Swindlers.

Valparaiso, Nov. 24.—A special dispatch from Omaha, Nebraska, says: In the examination of the affairs of the Valparaiso and G. A. Crafts, the swindling Valparaiso, Nebraska, Bank, it becomes evident that the swindling operations have been carried on in a systematic manner for some time. Several more crooked swindlers have come to light, among them are the forging of checks and mortgages to the extent of more than \$20,000. To one of these for \$9,000 was forged the name of L. Magee, of Valparaiso, and on property which Magee had owned or controlled. The name was forged to another \$1,500, also on property which was pledged to other parties. In both these cases the mortgages were made in Scoville's favor and were signed by him. He also executed forged instruments on several pieces of this county in various names on all property to which he ever had a shadow of title. Scoville is about thirty-seven years of age, was a member of the lower house of the Nebraska legislature in 1876-77, from Saunders county, and has always been regarded as a shrewd business man, and stood high in the community. Crafts, the swindler, was about twenty-three years of age, rather small in stature, well-complexioned, and wore a dark moustache. It is thought they have gone to Canada.

The Boston at Home Again.

New York, Nov. 24.—The United States steamer Boston, which was reported at Port au Prince, Haiti, where she was sent when the Haitian government seized the American steamer Haytien Republic anchored in quarantine. It is reported that the Boston returned to Haiti on account of yellow fever breaking out among the crew.

Injunction.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 24.—A telegram received in this city from Chancellor Gibson, of the Court at Knoxville, to-day had an injunction against the proposed East Tennessee by the railroad & Danville railroad, deeming that the two lines were competitive and that the charter of the latter gave no authority to lease.
