Conflicting Reports Concerning the Condition of Polk.

The Globe Unable to Get Later Particulars To-day.

BUT WE GAVE HIM A SEND OFF
People Who Come and Go—Brief Briefs of Interest to All Readers of The Globe.

The Raleigh Chronicle contained the following this morning:

WASHINGTON, June 9.—2:30 a. m.—The condition of Col. L. L. Polk is somewhat improved and his physicians have hopes that he will live through the night. His wife is expected in the morning and they have put forth strenuous efforts to keep him alive. He has regained consciousness and recognizes those around his bed.

WASHINGTON, June 9.—(Bulletin) 3:30 a. m.—Colonel Polk resting the same. Dr. Hayes at his bedside. Little or no hope of his recovery, though may live through to-morrow.

At 2 o'clock this afternoon we learned that Polk was dead. This morning at 10 o'clock we wired The News and Observer for information of his condition up to 3 this afternoon. At the hour of going to press no answer has been received.

Mr. Samuel Adams, of this city, claims to have information that Colonel Polk is dead.

In any event we have given the subject an editorial, and shall insist upon its truth until we hear further particulars.
