



A Thrilling Escape.

Yesterday evening as one of the street cars was coming down the sharp grade, west of Main Street Church, Adam Hall stepped upon the track in front of the rapidly moving car, presumably to cross to the other side of the street. The driver, seeing the imminent danger, pulled his horse from the track and LAWNS, applied the brakes, but too late: the car struck the old man, knocking him down, and, as both he and the driver at first thought, down to death. Here is the almost miraculous escape. In falling, Adam Hall's head was caught by some fixture of the geer and his heels became entangled in the trace chain. And thus suspended by head and heel he was dragged many yards down the track. His clothes were torn and his body badly bruised.


