The German Press on Harrison's Inaugural.

Berlin, March 5.—Excepting the papers here reserve their opinions on President Harrison's inauguration. The Tagblatt says that the address shows an arrogant spirit, and that it does not display a particularly friendly feeling toward the new powers.

The Vossische Zeitung says: "The friends of America hoped for a more friendly disposition from Harrison than from Cleveland. The message hardly strengthens that hope."

These criticisms arise from ill-founded expectations that the message would contain some delivery on the Samoan dispute which would indicate the intention of the new government to reverse the Bayard policy in a direction that would meet Germany's desires. More balanced and better conceived utterances ought to appear in the semi-official press, which, though not likely to comment on the message with a spirit of admiration, will not commit the mistake of supposing that Harrison ought to have made a more explicit statement regarding Samoa. In brief allusion the Vossische Nachrichten speaks of Harrison's declarations as in every way calculated to inspire confidence in the speedy and successful settlement.

The recall of Capt. Leary already indicates that another and healthier peace has begun to blow in Washington tonight.

A Large Establishment Fails.

Reading, Pa., March 5.—The announcement is made here this afternoon of the failure of the Reading Iron Works, which operates in this city blast furnaces, rolling mill, sheet, tube and pipe mills, forges and machine shops, employing over 2,500 hands. The firm has given notice of suspension of its payments and called a meeting of its creditors to be held at the Philadelphia office of the company next Thursday afternoon. It is one of the largest establishments of its kind in America and dispenses in wages in this city every year over \$1,000,000. The first judgment entered against the company was by the Reading Railroad Company for \$140,000. The failure is generally attributed to the stringent condition of the iron trade.

Washington Notes.

Washington, March 5.—The Treasury today accepted bonds \$755,000, all four and four and a half per cents.

Mr. Randall, chairman of the House committee on appropriations, yesterday submitted to the House a statement showing the amount of appropriations carried by the general appropriation bills passed at the session closed yesterday and comparison is made with the estimates of the departments and laws for the current year. This statement shows that the total estimates submitted amounted to \$297,285,090; the sum appropriated to \$281,878,695, and the sum carried in the laws for the current year to \$306,985,544.

Harrison's Cabinet.

Washington, D.C., March 5.—President Harrison to-day sent to the Senate the following nominations: Secretary of State, James G. Blaine of Maine; Secretary of the Treasury, William Windom, of Minnesota; Secretary of War, Redfield Proctor, of Vermont; Secretary of the Navy, Benjamin F. Tracy, of New York; Secretary of the Interior, John W. Noble, of Missouri; Postmaster-General, John W. Wainwright, of Pennsylvania; Attorney-General, W. H. Miller, of Indiana; Secretary of Agriculture, Jeremiah Rusk, of Wisconsin. The nominations were confirmed in ten minutes' session of the Senate.

Market House and Hall Burned.

Philadelphia, March 5.—The Columbia avenue market house and hall at Broad street and Columbia avenue was totally destroyed by fire this morning. Only the walls of the large market building were standing. The building was owned by Richard J. Robbins. Loss estimated at \$150,000.

Earthquake.

Quayquil, Ecuador, March 5.—A sharp shock of an earthquake has been felt here since 11 p. m., March 5. One at 8:40 p. m., March 3d, lasted 8 seconds.

London, March 5.—The English detectives who were sent to Madrid to identify the remains of the assassin of the British consul, who then ordered that the body be interred.
