CAPT. DAWSON'S FUNERAL.

An Outpouring of the People—Some Details of the Murder.

A Charleston special to the Richmond Dispatch of yesterday says: "Capt. Dawson was buried this evening in St. Lawrence cemetery. The funeral services were held at the Cathedral, Bishop Northrop officiating, assisted by Monsignor Quigley and Father Duffy. The church was jammed, all the city turning out to do honor to his memory. The funeral cortege was the longest seen in Charleston for many years. As it passed through King street on its way to the cemetery, the street was lined with sympathetic lookers on, who, standing with bared heads in a driving rain, bore mute, but eloquent witness to his great popularity. The honorary list of pall-bearers was made up of the most eminent men in the city. The scene at the grave could not have been more pathetic.

THE MURDERER EXCITED.

Dr. McDow, the murderer, is in jail and is very much excited. He is evidently a liar as well as an assassin. The indignation of the community is simply overwhelming. The more the murder is stirred the deeper the intensity of its barbarity appears. McDow claims that he shot Capt. Dawson in self-defence.

"Dawson," he says, "came into my office and struck me first in the chest and as he is a pugilist I was staggered (although he scarcely seemed to make an effort in dealing me the blow), and I fell over on the sofa. As I recovered myself he struck me over the head with his cane. When I got to my desk I pulled out a revolver I had in it and shot him. It was all over in a minute and a half. I had never seen Capt. Dawson know him well before. They say that money is the root of evil. I think that is a mistake, and that women are. A woman is at the bottom of this. It is no doubt a great fault, but it is nevertheless true that I am addicted to the sin of running after women. Capt. Dawson had a French governess for his children, with whom I had an affair, and yesterday I met her by appointment and took a car and rode to the terminus of the railway with her. We were shadowed by a detective, and the matter was reported to Capt. Dawson."

McDow is alleged to be untruthful by nature and he is known to be a libertine. He has no standing among the medical men of the city. He is essentially vulgar in his liaisons, and on more than one occasion has been caught in unprofessional conduct.

WHAT IS CLAIMED.

When the case comes to trial it will be proved, it is claimed, that McDow shot Capt. Dawson as he was leaving the office; that he tried to bury the body of his victim in a closet under the stairs of his house; that he dragged the body through the hall after he shot him; that he locked himself in with his victim and watched his dying struggles; that he tried to hide the evidence of his bloody deed by throwing his victim's body into a vault, and that he acted throughout the terrible affair with the malignity of a fiend. There is nothing like his crime in the annals of the State.

WENT TO EXPOSTULATE.

The facts show that Captain Dawson went to McDow's office to expostulate with him about his conduct towards the French maid in his family; that McDow in fact called him into his office, and having looked him in he murdered him in cold blood. The inquest will be held to-morrow. There has been strong talk of lynching the murderer; as this would be the last thing that Captain Dawson himself would desire, it is hoped that the better counsel of his friends will prevail, and that the law will be suffered to take its course.

AN AFFECTING INCIDENT.

An affecting incident of the funeral to-day was the presentation of a simple but elegant crown of white daisies by the Confederate Survivors Association, of which Captain Dawson was a member. A plaster cast of his face was taken by Viett, the sculptor, before the coffin was closed. The house of the chieftain was thronged up to the time the coffin was closed by people of all classes and conditions. Strong men wept when they looked into his face, and the grief of the poor people whom he had befriended through his charity was overpowering. He was buried with the ribbon of the Order of St. Gregory the Great in his button hole.
