THERE is no doubt that the Republican leaders will pass the Force bill if they can once more secure power. Mr. Harrison and Mr. Reid believe that the Republicans should control the registration, the elections, the counting and the certification of the result in every Congressional district in the country. Such a law would utterly override the local election machinery. Instead of election officers chosen by the people there would be election officers appointed by the politicians at Washington. The prospect that the Republicans will pass a Force bill if they get into power is an important reason for voting against Harrison and Weaver and every Republican and Third party candidate for Congress.

THE visit of Gen. Adlai E. Stevenson to this city, Thursday, was a grand occasion. The Gen. and Mrs. Stevenson were naturally the centres of attraction, and to them was given an ovation that left nothing to be desired. As the crowd, notwithstanding the inclement weather, was immense and the occasion great, so were the addresses of the highest order. Gen. Stevenson's speech was clear and forcible. He gave evidence in every utterance of his earnestness, his deep conviction, his lofty patriotism and his thorough comprehension of the great issues involved.

WE think those who are inclined to vote the Third party ticket do greatly err, and when they come seriously to reflect upon the dangers that threaten us in the event of Republican success, we feel confident most of them will see that it is no time for division. The force bill, one of the most dangerous measures ever attempted to be fastened upon a free and intelligent people, demands the united opposition of Americans and until it is killed and buried beyond the power of resurrection free men cannot afford to divide.

MR. CLEVELAND'S letter of acceptance which was given to the public Monday is a model of frank, honest and straight-forward sense—the best and highest statesmanship. There is not a word of dodging in it. He stands on his platform without evasion and appeals to his past record without misgiving. As a whole the letter is a concise, clear-cut statement of the Democratic position in the present contest and will command wide attention and generous appreciation.

STATE NEWS.

Hattie Ponders, colored, shot and killed herself at Asheville Monday night.

M. R. Lang, of Greenville and Wilson, has made an assignment. Liabilities \$40,000.

The opening of the State Normal School at Greensboro has been postponed till October 5.

A white man named Justice, of Rutherford county, was recently killed by a train near Asheville.

J. M. Anderson, of Randleman, was killed at Danville, Tuesday, by a saw he used in cutting up wood.

Jas. Meadows, of Wilmington, committed suicide Monday by taking laudanum. He had quarreled with his wife.

Evangelist Fife is holding a successful meeting at Weldon this week. His next point is Mocksville, October 9th.

Grover Cleveland, Ben Harrison and Jim Weaver, have all been enrolled as pupils of the Concord graded school.

J. S. Poythress who accidentally shot and killed a colored woman at Henderson recently, came back Monday to stand trial.

Mrs. W. H. Landin, of Wilmington, attempted to kill herself Saturday with laudanum but failed, the dose being too large.

A colored woman, wife of Lum Hall, of Rowan county, while plowing with an oxen, Tuesday, was gored to death by the animal.

Harrison Lee, of Watauga county, accidentally shot and killed his friend named Featherstone while both were squirrel hunting, Thursday.

A little girl, about 8 years old, child of Jordan Hunter, was killed at Greensboro Saturday by an incoming train while playing on the track.

Mrs. Catharine Williams, of Bladen county, while in a state of mental derangement, Saturday, committed suicide by drowning herself in a canal.

The Presbyterian Synod of this State will establish a preparatory school at Mebane in the buildings formerly occupied by the Bingham School.

David Ayers, colored, of Selma, was killed by a train while walking along the track of the R. & D. R. R., near Raleigh, Monday night. He had been drinking.

Jack Edwards, an engineer on the Western North Carolina Railroad, was fatally stabbed in the throat and abdomen by Will Cowan during an altercation at Asheville Saturday night.

The flag of the Cleveland Guards captured by the Ninth Massachusetts regiment at the battle of Hancock Court House, May, 27, 1862, was brought back to Shelby Thursday by a Boston delegation amid imposing ceremonies.

Davidson College has opened with a larger attendance than ever before in its history. Hazing has been entirely abolished by the united action of the body of students.

Mr. J. E. Brown, Jr., of Charlotte, has been elected Gymnasium Director for the ensuing year.

Jas. R. Chatum, who stole a horse and buggy and abducted Mattie Phillips, aged 14, in Chatham county recently and feloniously assaulting her afterwards, was captured in Darlington, S. C. brought back and lodged in jail at Raleigh to prevent a lynching at Pittsboro.

At the meeting of the stockholders of the A. & N. C. R. R. Company at Morehead City, Thursday, W. S. Chadwick, Esq., was re-elected President, F. C. Roberts, Secretary and Treasurer. The Directors elected by the Stockholders are: Paul Faison, Raleigh; J. M. Morehead, Durham; Arnold Borden, Goldsboro and Dempsey Wood, Falling Creek. The Finance Committee is: Thos. Daniels, E. B. Hackburn, J. J. Wolfenden, Newbern; S. I. Wooten, Lenoir county; Thos. H. Mallison, Croatan. A resolution endorsing the present administration and recommending President Chadwick to the incoming Governor for re-election next year, was unanimously adopted.
