THE TARIFF IN NEXT CONGRESS.

As a pretext for tariff tinkering it is asserted over and over again that many luxuries are imported under light duties, and that if the duties should be raised there would be a large increase of revenue. The fact is that the duties on luxuries are now so high that an increase would defeat revenue by checking imports.

But all the talk of tariff legislation in the next Congress is mere bluff and lamson. The Republicans will not have the power to change the tariff, if they had the will, until some time after the fourth of March, 1897.

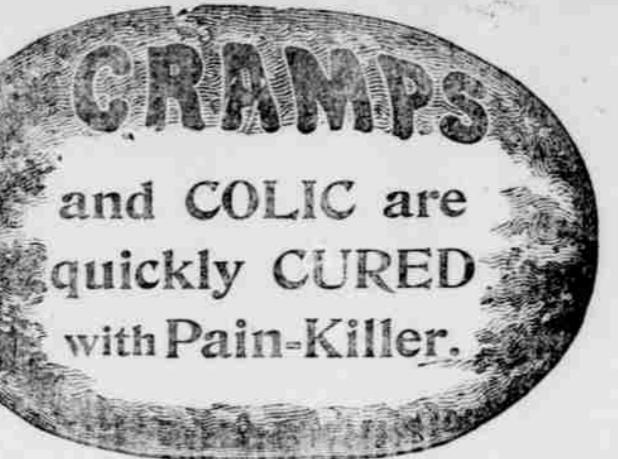
