RUSSIANS HALT VON MACKENSEN

Invaders Almost at Gates of Bucharest.

RUSSIANS GAIN FROM NORTH

Russian troops have been forced to mark a temporary halt in their advance upon the fortress from the north. This progress continues in the face of desperate Romanian resistance. Palkenhay's forces have advanced about thirty miles from the Rumanian frontier.

In a flank elevation, the effort to avert a junction of the main forces of Mackensen and Palkenhay, the Rumanians, aided by Russian troops, are offering battle on a front of fifty miles along the Arges river. South of Bucharest the Rumanian forces, according to Petrograd, have inflicted a defeat on Mackensen's army, driving them off toward the south.

On the other hand, a Toton flanking movement disconcerts the Rumanian column south of the capital is admitted by the Rumanian war office.

Will Exceed Romanian Effort in the Transylvanian Alps continues without a moment's lull. Petrograd claims the capture of two villages and 300 prisoners. Berlin asserts all on-abouts were without a fall.

Reports of a partial capture of Kiribaba, one of the "gates" to the Hungarian plains, are disposed of by the Rumanian statement that the fighting centers on the region "east and north" of that point. Moreover, the Toton are on the offensive in this area, though Petrograd asserts they were repulsed.

Of tremendous economic importance is an official statement issued in Berlin supplementary to the account of the military operations. It talks of the importance of a "military administration" in the country.

"Cultivation of the country will be carried out according to the principles previously established, which partly correspond to the necessities of Rumanian and partly account for the necessities of the central powers cut off by England, contrary to international law."

Apart from indicating that the German government appears to feel certain that the Toton army in Rumania will stay, the statement clearly foreshadows extensive exploitation of the tremendous Rumanian resources, particularly in oil, grain, wheat and cattle.

General Tschirch von Tschirch and Wismar, formerly chief commander of the Rumanian army, with headquarters at Coblenz, had been appointed chief of the Toton military administration in Rumania.

Palkenhay's Drive On. The German claim that Palkenhay is advancing steadily and has reached Oweh is indirectly corroborated by the official Rumanian admission that King Ferdinand's forces have been compelled to retire "toward Tim." This town lies a little more than thirty miles northwest of Bucharest, on the railway, between Pitoc and the capital.

A Turkish division belonging to Marwan's Danube army was defeated, according to the Rumanian statement, in the region of Dragaseni, thirty miles southwest of Bucharest, while the main body of the Balgar-German army was driven back from the region some eleven miles southwest of the capital.

NEW MOOSE PARTY WITH T. R. MISSING

George W. Perkins Not Wanted Either, Leaders Say.

Political foes of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt and George W. Perkins are organizing a new party, the Progressive party.

Acting National Chairman Matthew Hale is to call a national conference to meet at St. Louis in January. Invitations are to be sent to Buhlerville Colby, John M. Parker, J. A. Hopkins, Judge Ben R. Lindsey and others who refused to contribute to the cause of Roosevelt and Perkins and accept Charles E. Hughes as presidential candidate.

CONGRESS MEETS AGAIN.
Wilson's Railway Bills and Export Trade Expansion to Be Pushed.

The fifty-fourth congress has begun its final session with a heavy program to be completed before it. Chief items on the remainder of President Wilson's railway legislation designed to make transportation strikes impossible, enlarging the powers and work and increasing the membership of the interstate commerce commission; the immigration bill, organization of trading interests for foreign trade, a comprehensive system of waterways, rivers and harbor improvement, the western water bill and appropriation bills.

GENERAL NEWS EVENTS.

Openings of Interest in Various Parts of Our Country.

Governor James Ferguson of Texas expressed approval of the existing high cost of living. He said the farmers "are coming into their own and are entitled to all they can get." Governor Ferguson is a farmer.

More than a billion more cigarettes were made in the United States during the fiscal year 1916 than in the previous year, and a million more cigars. The stamp tax on the sale of playing cards showed an increase of \$30,440.

The Canadian government announces the establishment of a state owned steamship line between Canadian Atlantic and Pacific ports via the Panama canal. Three big tonnage vessels will be built in British Columbia, for which tenders are being prepared.
