Emanuel, junk dealer of Goldsboro, has shipped since first day of January, 15,000 lbs of rags and 26,000 lbs of junk, and is still buying. Calves are dying in Mecklenburg county with hydrophobia, and mosquitoes in Newbern are passing away from earth to eternity with small-pox. We are informed that Maj. J. C. Winder has been appointed General Manager of the Raleigh and Augusta Air-Line and Carolina Central Railroad. We learn that Mr. J. W. Harper, formerly of the Kingston Journal, has bought the material and good will of the Commercial News, and will at an early day commence the publication of a daily newspaper. A Fall River turkey in being prepared for the spit was found to have a gold thimble in its gizzard. FIRE.—On Thursday night, March 9th, a fire broke out in Dodson's Art Gallery. Shortly after the alarm the fire company appeared on the spot and made noble efforts to save the building, but the configuration made such rapid headway that all endeavors to quench the flames were useless. All of Mr. Dodson's material was destroyed, his loss being estimated at five hundred dollars, with no insurance. Under the gallery Mr. Royal kept a grocery and provision store, and nearly everything belonging to him was saved, with the exception of about one hundred dollars worth of goods. The building was the property of Mr. Borden, President of the Bank of New Hanover. His loss, we understand, is in the neighborhood of three thousand dollars; insurance, four thousand dollars.

DEATHS.—Our city was greatly shocked on Wednesday night, March 8th, over the sudden death of our much loved and respectable young townsman, Richard McRae, which occurred about eight o'clock. Richard had worked all day, and was in apparently good health. He was on his way home to supper in company with Ben Hogan and Willis Peel, when he suddenly fell backward, and in a few minutes life was pronounced extinct by Dr. W. H. H. Cobb. The funeral services took place on Friday afternoon at the Baptist Church. He was an honest, upright and industrious young man, and all that knew him regrets his death. We chronicle in to-day's issue, the death of Mr. George Washington's mother, which occurred on Friday night, March 10th. This lady was endowed with the kindest feelings, and her loss will be regretted by all who knew her.

MURDER IN WAYNE COUNTY.—On Saturday night, March 4th, about three miles west of LaGrange, on the plantation of Jno Ialer, William Bridges and Mack Lenair, two colored men, out Frank Best so severely that he died on Saturday night, the 11th inst. The Coroner, Dr. Geo. L. Kirby, when notified of the fact, at once summoned a jury and an inquest was held over the body of the deceased, and the verdict was, that Frank Best came to his death from mortal wounds at the hands of William Bridges and Mack Lenair. We are informed by Deputy Sheriff V. R. Parker, that there were several white men at the negro frolic where the stabbing occurred, and that they, as well the colored men, became intoxicated from wine which was purchased from the Lord of the Manor. If our farmers continue to deal out wine and other spirits to irresponsible parties at these low, mixed gatherings, we may expect nothing but all sorts of crime to be committed in Wayne county. The pages of our criminal docket has been recorded with the blackest crimes for the past six years. The prisoners, Bridges and Lanier, are now confined in jail awaiting their trial.
