DRYS WON IN FIFTEEN COUNTIES. LIFE INSURANCE FOR DRYS

Twenty-One Counties of South Carolina Held Elections Yesterday.

Charleston, S. C., August 17 .- The unofficial returns from the elections held in twenty-one of the so-called 'wet" counties of South Carolina for the purpose of allowing the voters of each county to choose between prohibition and the county dispensary system indicate that the prohibitionists have won victories in fifteen of these counties. Complete returns from some precincts not reported tonight may change the result in two Abbeville, Bamberg, Barnwell, Berkeley, Calhoun, Colleton, Dorchester,

eGorgetown and Beaufort. The election was without excitement or special incident in any couny and a small vote was polled.

The majorities for prohibition ac cording to the present returns, which ere in most cases ora fealty con icte, range from fourteen in Calaoun county to 982 in Orangeburg county.
