THE ELECTORAL VOTE.

The Presidential count bill, which passed the Senate without amendment, provides that the Presidential electors of each State shall meet and give their votes on the second Monday in January next following their appointment at such places as the Legislatures of the States may direct: that each State, pursuant to its laws existing on the day fixed for the appointment of the electors, may determine prior to the meeting of the electors any controversy concerning the appointment of all or any of them; that such determination shall be conclusive evidence of their lawful title and shall govern in the count by Congress.

The bill furthermore provides that no electoral vote or votes from any State from which but one return has been received shall be rejected, except by the affirmative votes of the two houses; that if more than one return is received from a State the votes of those electors who have been appointed by the lawful tribunal of the State shall be counted and in the event of a question as to which of two or more of such State tribunals is the lawful tribunal, the votes of the electors appointed by that tribunal which the two houses, acting separately, shall decide to be the authorized one shall be counted; that in cases of an undetermined contest between two or more sets of electors of a State, those votes shall be counted which the two houses, acting separately, shall decide to be the lawful electoral votes.

The bill also provides that if the counting of the votes shall not have been completed before the fifth calendar day next after the first joint meeting of the two houses, no recess shall be afterward taken by either house until the counting is finished.

The Methodist Episcopal Conference at Newark, N. J., Tuesday, adopted a resolution approving President Arthur's veto of the Chinese bill.

The petition in favor of the pardon of Sergeant Mason preparing in New York for presentation to the President is now a mile long and the number of names is approaching a half million.

FOR THE BUGLE.

ED. BUGLE: With pain we noticed your reference to the advertised sale of the Greensboro Female College, but rejoiced at the determined belief and expectation that Methodism must not surrender it. The sale of the Troy University, New York, to the Roman Catholics entailed inestimable loss.

To stimulate those bearing this burden, allow the writer to mention a curious coincidence between this institution and that called the Greenwich Academy, a similar conference school in East Greenwich, Rhode Island, the home of General Nat. Greene, our city's name sake.

Through extensive repairs, in 1873, an old debt and much mismanagement, at the great pain and general depreciation of property, this school found itself under a debt of \$40,000.

Again and again was it advertised for sale, though none would give even the face of the mortgage for it; but as often was it rescued by the heroic interposition of the credit of two other noble christian men, themselves already burdened nearly to bankruptcy.

The trustees employed and kept in the field for six years a man of prayer and work, who little by little has been able, no one knows exactly how, to raise the whole sum. This year Greenwich Academy, an institution of 80 years standing goes forth free. So may the Greensboro Female College.

HOPEFUL.

It is a popular error to suppose that ivy growing on the walls of a house makes it damp. The attachment of ivy to walls, so far from injuring them and causing dampness, is an advantage. If the walls are dry when planted, ivy will keep them so. If damp, as the plant overspreads their surface the dampness will disappear. Where dampness prevails ivy sucks out the moisture, and its thick foliage will prevent the access of rain to the structure; and thus it is not only a remover, but a preventive, of dampness. The only danger attending the planting of ivy on buildings is where fissures occur in the walls, in which case the shoots and roots will enter, and, if left undisturbed, their growth will soon begin to tell upon the building and will, by increase of growth, push against the side of the opening, thereby enlarging it, and eventually so weaken the walls as to cause it to fall. Where the wall is sound there is no such danger, for the plant does not make fissures, although quick to discover them.

The Department will commence the issue to-day, of a new postage stamp of the denomination of five cents, and of the following general description: On a tablet is suspended an incised shield decorated with an oval of pearls, forming a framework to the portrait of the late President of the United States, James Abram Garfield, looking towards the left, engraved in line. At the base of the oval is a dark, six-pointed star, relieved by a white outline, and in the centre the figure "5." Disposed on the right and left of the star flows a ribbon containing the legend "Five Cents," in white Roman capitals. Below the star and ribbon, on the lower portion of the tablet, appear the words "U. S. Postage," engraved in dark letters. The color of the stamp is chocolate brown.

About the same time the issue of new five-cent stamped envelopes, to take the place of those of like denomination now in use, will be commenced. The envelope stamps will be somewhat similar in design to the new adhesive stamp of corresponding denomination, and of about the same color. The shape of the stamp embossed on the envelope will be oval.
