

doubt that they will do so; but the question must be "definitely determined" by Congress, and that will not be effected without a struggle between the several interests.—(16.)

On a former trial, the jury having failed to come to a decision in the case of Jacob Barker, H Eckford, Gen. Swift, &c for conspiracy at New York, another Court of Oyer and Terminer has just been convened to try the same indictments. Three hundred jurors were summoned, almost every one of whom was challenged and subjected to an investigation as to the existence of any prejudices which could influence his legal verdict. The jury was at length completed, and the trial is now progressing. The District Attorney has signified to the Court his intention not to try Henry Eckford, Gen. Swift and Wm. P. Rathbone, with the others implicated, but that he should try the rest on the indictment. After this was announced to the Court, Jacob Barker moved that he might be tried separately, and supported his motion by an argument of some length. The Court, however, denied the application.

A LEGISLATOR'S OATH.

The following oath is administered to each member of the Legislature of Georgia on taking his seat:

"I, A. B. do solemnly swear or affirm (as the case may be) that I have not obtained my election by bribery, THREATS, canvassing, or other undue, or unlawful means, used by myself or others, by my desire or approbation, for that purpose; that I consider myself constitutionally qualified as a Senator or Representative, and that on all questions and measures which may come before me, I will give my vote, and conduct myself as may, in my judgment, appear most conducive to the interest and prosperity of this state; and that I will bear faith and allegiance to the same, and, to the utmost of my ability, I do hereby confirm to support and defend the Constitution thereof."

AMERICAN MANUFACTURES

—The present duty of 33 1/3 on foreign woolen cloths (remarks the Compiler) is said to be too inconsiderable to enable us to compete with the British manufactures. Fifty per cent. is represented to be necessary—and 50 per cent. will therefore be pressed upon the next Congress. If 50 per cent. should not be found adequate to give our own manufacturers profit and encouragement enough to relieve their distresses, or satisfy their cupidity, Congress may raise it to 75 per cent.—or, lay an absolute prohibition on the importation. With these arrangements, it would be hard, if the stock vested in woolen manufactures which has increased in a few years from ten to sixty millions, should not rapidly rise to one or two hundred millions. Then, we shall have the comfort of sleeping under our own American blankets, wearing all our own cloths, and excluding all exotics. What, though we pay three, or four times as dear for them, we have the consolation to think, it is the work of our own hands. These articles are the products of American industry—shall we still hear the cry of distress from the Manufactures or may we not sometimes hear that of the people?

FROM JAMAICA.

We have received our regular files of Kingston, Jamaica papers to the 26th ult by the brig Hunter, Captain Armstrong, arrived below in twenty three days from Kingston. We notice nothing local in them materially interesting to the American reader the effects of the prohibition of all intercourse between the U. States and the Colonies are severely felt, and much complained of. Flour is now quoted at 6 dollars a barrel.

ceived from a customer in North Carolina. They appear to be a new issue, and well executed—description as follows: One \$20, Richmond Deposit, payable to C. Graunt, date 2nd April 1825. Two 10's. Richmond Deposit, payable to R Gray, same date—Signatures tolerably well done. We have likewise been shown a counterfeit 50 dollar Note of the Cape Fear Bank, Wilmington Deposit, dated 1st Jan. 1826, admirably executed in all its parts, and well calculated to deceive even the most cautious. The public will of course be on their guard.—Pet. Int.

Counterfeit Notes.—We understand that 50 dollar notes of the Bank of Cape Fear, letter F, dated January 1. 1826, payable to P. Orr, W. Anderson, Cashier, and John London, President, are in circulation in and near this place. They are well executed, and calculated to deceive the best judges without minute examination.—Lynchburg (Va) Virginian.

CAPTAIN PARRY'S NEW EXPEDITION.

It is stated in an English paper, that, early in the spring, the Hecla is to be prepared to convey Captain Parry and Captain Franklin to Claven Cliff, in Spitzbergen, in lat. 77 deg. 52 min. From this point they are to depart for the Pole in two vessels, which will be made for use either as boats or sledges as water or ice may be found. They are to be built of light, tough, and soft materials, with covering of leather and oil cloth; the latter convertible into sails. Two officers and ten men are to be appointed to each, with provisions for ninety two days, which if they only travelled on the average thirteen miles per day and met with no insurmountable obstacles, would be sufficient for their reaching the long desired Pole, and returning to the Hecla at Claven Cliff. During the Captain's absence, the boats of the ship are to be engaged in exploring the Eastern side of Spitzbergen; and the officers and men of science in making philosophical experiments with the pendulum on magnetism and on meteorology, mineral history, &c. The reward of success, besides the personal glory and general advantage attending this exploit, will be £5,000.

GENERAL BANKRUPT LAW

The Legislature of Rhode Island; at its late Session passed a Resolution requesting their Senators and Representatives in Congress; to use their influence and exertions to produce the passage of a general Bankrupt Law.

The election for a Representative in Congress from Kentucky, in the place of Colonel James Johnson, deceased, took place on Wednesday, the 8th instant. There were four candidates; and, as far as the returns had been received, their relative positions were—Mr. M'HATTON 967; SANFORD 280; COLEMAN 428; BROWN 480.

New Invention.—A patent has been granted to Justin Jacob, of Montreal, for the invention of a new engine for propelling the machinery of mills. The moving power is a perpendicular lever, hung like a pendulum, the vibrations of which move a pair of hands to and fro upon a rag wheel, by which the labor of two men is sufficient for propelling the machine-

ry to any use required. A model of the same is now lodged in the provincial secretary's office.

LORD COCHRANE.—The Liverpool Commercial Chronicle remarks, that great hopes are entertained of the speedy embarkation, and full equipment, of the steam vessels for Lord Cochrane. There was every reason to believe they would proceed to the Mediterranean very soon.

The Secretaries.—It is stated that Mr. Secretary Rush has been quite ill for several days with a severe bilious affection, but is now somewhat better. Mr. Secretary BARBOUR, who also had a severe attack, (believed to be the first illness of his whole life) continues to gain health. Mr. Secretary CLAY, is absent on a visit to West Point, where he has a son at the Military Academy.
