## LATEST NEWS.

Instantly Killed.

Wilmington, N. C., July 7.—Capt. William M. Swann, a well known citizen, was instantly killed near the Atlantic Coast Line Station this morning. He was standing near the track when a large pile of lumber fell from a car while in motion, crushing him into almost unrecognizable mass of flesh and bones.

The Century Magazine Burned Out.

New York, July 7.—Smoke and flames poured out of the windows of a big brick building on Eighteenth street between Broadway and Fourth avenue shortly after midnight. The third alarm was sent out and the guests of the Everett House, next door, were ordered to leave their rooms. The burned building forms the rear of what is known as the Century building, as it is there the Century Magazine is published.

A Lynching in Kentucky.

Nashville, Tenn., July 7.—A special to the American from Henderson, Ky., says: Robt. Bryan, a 16 year old negro boy stabbed Riley Hancock, white, aged nineteen years yesterday and killed him, near Smith's mills. Three men started to Hendersons with Bryan, and just in the outskirts of the town, were over taken by fifty masked men, who drove Bryan's guards off, and lynched the murderer to the nearest tree.

Bloodshed Expected.

Lexington, Ky., July 7.—The latest intelligence from Georgetown is that great excitement now exists there over the prospective war between the sheriff's posse and the band gathered together by Caleb Parker, the murderer of Sacodia Connellus, Jr. It is reported that Parker has been located in the hills of Scott county, where he is fortified and protected by friends; all of whom are heavily armed. It is feared that an attempt to take him will result in bloodshed.

A Train Bombed With Stones.

Chicago, July 7.—As passenger train No. 17 on the Burlington road was leaving Chicago last evening a rock was thrown through the cab window of the engine, narrowly missing Engineer Farnsworth and Fireman Corkery. The windows on both sides of the cab were broken. At Riverside and again at Naperville the engine was bombed. At the former place a perfect storm of stones was thrown, battering the side of the engine and breaking more glass. At Naperville Fireman Corkery was struck on the head with a flying missile which inflicted a slight scalp wound, but he was not injured so badly that he could not continue his work.

The Bank Robbers.

Raleigh, N. C., July 7.—Judge Avery opens court here Monday and among the most important trials to come up is that of Cross and White, the bank robbers. The case excites great interest. It is docketed case twenty three, but will probably be the twelfth or fifteenth case called if tried. Counsel for the defendants have been doing earnest work for their clients this week. They have examined every scrap of paper connected with the case, and if there is a possibility of detecting a flaw in the bills of indictment it has been found. A gentleman in a position to know stated to day that a movement will be made to quash every indictment in the case.

This effort will be based on what is known as the agreement made between the Canadian authorities and the State authorities, to which White and Cross agreed at the time of their return from Canada. If unsuccessful, it is expected that an effort will be made to postpone the hearing of the case.
