TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

YELLOW FEVER.

Latest News From the Plague-Stricken District.

Jacksonville, Sept. 25.—The weather has cleared off and is cool and pleasant. The declaration of a yellow fever epidemic in Fernandina opens the quarantine of that place, and it is expected that more than two thousand colored people will flock here seeking fresh food, and prompt steps will be taken to guard this city against an influx of new material for fever, by increasing the sanitary police guarding the outskirts. About thirty new cases have been reported this morning. There are no official reports of deaths, but among them is known to be John L. Burch, one of the board of public works. The executive committee of the sanitary association this morning took steps to more stringently guard against frauds and imposition.

Jackson, Miss., Sept. 25.—There were no deaths or new cases of yellow fever here since Sunday morning. The health authorities are endeavoring to establish a refuge camp near the city and the Howard Association will furnish supplies only to such as go there.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 25.—Surgeon General Hamilton has received the following additional dispatches:

Jackson, Miss., Sept. 25.—Total number of cases to date 14; deaths 5. No new cases reported for the twenty-four hours ending at 6 p. m. yesterday. We have the city surrounded by a cordon and have done all we can to prevent the spread of the disease. Tents have arrived to day and refuge camps will be established as soon as possible.

Fernandina, Sept. 25.—Will you permit refugees from this city at Camp Perry? If so, how many? What kind of certificates will be required?

The following is from Gov. Peay: Tallahassee, Fla., Sept. 25.—Kindly include Fernandina among the fever-stricken towns which you are aiding.

A Railway Wreck.

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 25.—About 9:30 last evening a northbound engine on the Southeast branch of the Pennsylvania Railroad, running at the rate of about thirty miles an hour, struck a cow between Fair Chance and Uniontown, throwing the engine off the track and completely overturning it, instantly killing one man named Leander Miller, residing at Fair Chance. It is supposed he was stealing his way to Uniontown. Engineer Thompson, of Uniontown, brakeman Rush, of Uniontown and Conductor Dinges of Pittsburg, were also severely injured, but will recover. The wreck caused several hours delay to trains.

Fleeing For Safety.

Memphis, Tenn., Sept. 25.—The steamboat P. C. Brown, from New Orleans, bound to Cincinnati, passed this place at midnight. She had 250 passengers, principally from Vicksburg. No one was permitted to disembark. All are reported well.

The panic feeling of the past four days has given way to a more rational view of the situation, and many of those who were most alarmed are now confident that there will be no farther spread of fever from either Decatur or Jackson, Miss. The exodus from this city has ceased.

A Gaffney Man Murdered.

Greenville, S. C., Sept. 25.—Report reached here from Gaffney's to-day that P. G. Petty, a drummer for a Baltimore hardware house, whose home is at Gaffney's and who is well known all over this State, had been found dead in Baltimore. His body was picked up from the water where he had been thrown, after being robbed and murdered.
