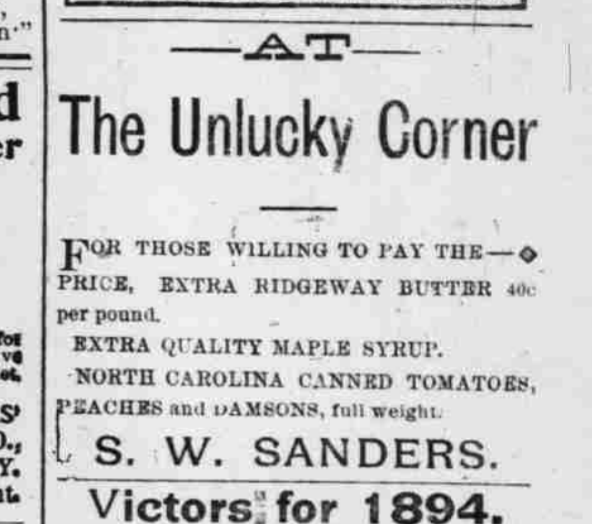
ATTACKED BY BLOODEADERS.
