### A VICTORY BY THE GREEKS.

#### THE TURKISH ARMY REPULSED AT VELESTINO.

The Greeks Abandoning Points in Thessaly and Epirus—The New Cabinet—Critical Situation of the Royal Army—The Greeks Hissed in the Streets of Athens, French Consulate at Constantinople Issuing Certificates of Protection to Greeks.

Volos, Thessaly, April 29.—A squadron of Greek warships has arrived here. There are 15,000 Greeks encamped at Velesino and 30,000 Greeks occupy positions at Pharsalos.

Larissa, April 28.—Volos has not yet been captured but the town is practically at the mercy of the Turks. The Greek tactics are difficult to understand. It is asked here why, if the Greeks intended to retire to Pharsalos, when the Turks entered the plain, they did not destroy the telegraph lines, bridges and food supplies as well as unexploded magazines and why they did not take the guns instead of leaving them almost everything necessary for a great army. Inasmuch as they lost their heads it is not thought likely that they will offer an effective resistance.

Washington, April 30.—Senators Allison and Aldrich spent the day in finishing the finishing touches to the tariff bill. They were the only members of the sub-committee in the city. The bill has been completed in all essential particulars and now only remains to be put in shape for presentation to the Democrats. The sub-committee is still, however, receiving suggestions from other senators, Messrs. Quay, Penrose, Foraker and Smith being among those who called today.

The members of the sub-committee declined to reveal the changes agreed upon even to their senatorial colleagues. Indeed senators generally are as ignorant of the amendments agreed upon as is the general public, and it is safe to say that the report, when made, will contain many surprises.

The republican members of the committee are still negotiating with the Democrats, and it is not yet understood as to the time to be consumed in considering the bill in full committee, but have not succeeded in securing any definite agreement. The Democrats say that the length of time taken in committee will depend entirely upon the character of the amendments.

It is understood to be one of the purposes of the Democratic members of the finance committee to offer several amendments and force the vote on them so as to put the Republicans on record and they were put in having the cooperation of Senator Jones, of Nevada, in some of their propositions.

Senator Jones' motion appears to be that he will demand certain concessions, most of them affecting western interests, and if he does not get them from the Republicans he will join the Democrats in order to get them, and, as a last resort, the Democratic members have indicated a willingness to assist him.

Demands of Austria and China have caused exports of \$5,500,000, merchandise imports are greatly increased and final action of Congress on the revenue question seems remote.

Wheat rose last Saturday nearly 2 cents, but fell since that date 1 cent. This is largely because European markets did not sustain the export price of a great foreign demand after the outbreak of war and because events appeared to foreshadow speedy peace, but the falling of wheat prices was disappointing. Expectations of the speedy end of war in Europe through Turkish victory have helped to depress trade. Demands of Austria and China have caused exports of \$5,500,000, merchandise imports are greatly increased and final action of Congress on the revenue question seems remote.
