A Wonderful Girl Preacher.

A series of meetings have been going on three weeks in our city under the auspices of our colored churches. The services have been conducted by Claretta Nora Avery, a young colored girl of only 11 years of age, whose preaching has been a marvel to all who have heard her. She talks well, uses good language, is remarkably familiar with scripture, and is a fluent, inpressive speaker. The fact is there is an impressiveness and force about her discourses that is almost supernatural. Her preaching has the most astonishing effect upon her hearers and both colored and white people are flocking to the various churches where she conducts the meetings.

This wonderful girl preacher was born in Washington, D. C., but has lived a portion of her life at Columbia S. C. They tell us that she only attended school three days on three different occasions, as her health would not permit her to go to school. So all of her intelligence and force is natural. It is said she was converted when 18 months of age, and began to preach when she was 7 years of age. She has preached in many of the large cities of the south and north, including New York and Boston. She has been preaching here for three weeks, and since that time more than a hundred souls have decided to live for Christ through the power of her preaching.

Friday night she preached at Christ Congregational church to a large audience of both white and colored people, and entertained them for an hour or more. The services opened with singing, after which she made an effective prayer. She then read a scriptural lesson and preached a remarkable sermon on "Grace." She pronounces distinctly, and her sentences were well rounded.

She will preach at Christ Congrega tional church this morning at 11 a. m and 8 p. m., and at Carolina Beach at 3 p. m. She leaves here Monday for Philadelphia, where she has an en-
