The captain and eight seamen were saved. Sixteen went down with the unfortunate vessel. The weather was foggy, ut not so thick that the vessel's speed vas reduced. Captain Knudson said he ould see about three cable lengths head. The wind was fairly direct from he west southwest, when a vessel ails full, and stood directly across the ow of the steamer. The bells were rung to stop and back at full speed but too late to check the steamer's eadway. The stranger, chooner, fell across the bow and with


