#### RASCALITY UNEARTHED

A Return to Days of Swepson-Littlefield-French Rule-Wake County Approaching Bankruptey Under Republican-Populist Management

Rogers, the register of deeds, and clerk of the board of commissioners made under Section 752 of the Code, of the receipts and disbursements of the county from the first Monday of December, 1896, to the first Monday of December, 1897, the first fiscal year of the present board of commissioners by which J. This statement of Mr. Rogers showd the receipts for the said fiscal year ere \$42,984.17 and that disbursements and Mr. Rogers and his friends give it ut to the people of the county that the present board saved about \$15,000 the county. Mr. Stronach called upn Mr. Haywood Knight, the treasurer of the county, to ascertain the truth of the statement. Mr. Knight said he had nothing to do with the statement and that it was incorrect. On the same lay Mr. Knight made a full examinaon of the books in his office, aided v Mr. J. O. Williams, the clerk in Mr. Rogers' office, and wrote Mr. Stronach he following letter: Office of Treasurer of Wake County.
