mission of the peace commissioners it is probable that in view of the actoday lasted from 2 to 4:30.0'clock p. m. During this time the commissioners discussed the second series of written arguments put forward by the Spaniards for the purpose of prevailing upon the American commissioners to assume the Cuban debt. No definite conclusion was reached. The commissioners adjourned till Monday, when the Cuban question will again be discussed. It is probable that this feature of the negotiations will be disposed of next week.

Thus far there have been seven joint sessions, four of which have been devoted to the discussion of the first arthele of the prospeol. In this manner two weeks have passed and no result has been reached. The American commissioners have distened to all the arguments of the Spaniards, but they have not changed the position which they first assumed, in refusing to take over the Caban dest.

THE EPISCOPAL COUNCIL

Increased Responsibilities of the Church by Reason of the Acquisition of Territory-To Elect Bishop of Asheville Today

Washington, October 21.-The increased responsibilities of the Episcopal church, arising through the changed conditions of Cuba, Porto Rico, Hawaii and the Philippines, was presented to the general convention today in the report of a special committee appointed to consider the condition of affairs in these outlying islands.

The committee proposed a resolution that missionary work begin in Porto Rico after conference with the bishop

The committee recommended a joint commission to consider the work in Cuba. The committee also pointed out that attention must be given to Cuba; not only as a possession of the United States, but as possibly an independent, self government country.

Concerning Hayti, Mexico, Brazil and other countries, it was recommended that the increased responsibilities be submitted to a joint commission of three bishops and three laymen. Major Taylor related the history the hospital from its inception. He said that recently he had had no dif ficulty in securing supplies as he had been given carte blanche to purchase them. This authority had not, however, been given until Lugust 1st; whreas, it had been asked as early as June 25th. He had in the beginning of the camp's history had considerable difficulty in getting requisitions filled, although he has had no sifficulty in getting them approved by the authorities at Washington. One requisition made on the 16th of May and another on the 24th of June had not been entirely filled until very recently. These requisitions had been many upon the New York supply depot, welle all that were made on the St. Louis depot had been promptly filled. One hundred and a sixteen cots ordered in the beginning of the season had only a ved a day or two since and they were not now needed. Dr. Taylor had, of account of delay in filling these require tions, been compelled to call upon the surgeon general for a portion of his special fund and had thus prevented any suf fering among patients. ### A BILL OF RIGHTS

P imulgated for Santiago Province by Acting Governor Wood

antiago de Cuba, October 21.-Genef 1 Leonard Wood, military governor p) tempore of the department of Santiligo, today issued a proclamation of r dependence.

The first articles guarantees to the people the right of assembly for the common good and to apply to those in power by petition or remonstrance for the redress of grievances.

The second section guarantees the right to worship God according to individual consciences, provided there is no interference with any existing form

of worship. The third section directs that courts of justice shall be open to all and that no private property shall be taken by the government without compensation. The fourth section, dealing with criminal trials, invests the accused wish the right to be heard himself or by counsel and to have compulsory preses sto secure the attendance of a witness in his behalf.


The fifth section says no person acused of crime shall be compelled to give evidence against himself.

The sixth section declares that no such person, who is once acquitted of the charge brought against him, shall be tried again for the same offense. The seventh section provides that all pe sons charged with crime shall be emitted to ball, except in cases of callital offence and that the writ of ha leas corpus may not be suspended, except when the commanding general of the department deems it advisable, The eighth section says that excessive bail shall not be required and

that no excessive fine or cruel or un-The ninth section provides that in order to secure the people against unreasonable search, there shall first be established under oath a presumption orguilt.
