Buffalo, September 6 .- Secretary Corlyou tonight gave out the following clock. One bullet struck him in the pper portion of the breast-bone, glancing and not penetrating, the second bullet penetrated the abdomen five thes below the left nipple and one and one-half inches to the left of the edial line. The abdomen was opened brough the line of the bullet wound. It as found that the bullet had penetratd the stomach. The opening in the front wall of the stomach was carefully closed with silk stitches, after which a further course of the bullet could not be discovered although careful search was made. The abdominal wound was losed without drainage. No injury to

His condition at present justifies hope of recovery." At 6.50 p. m. the physicians say that shile the wounds are serious they are necessarily fatal. The bullet in the ledomen has not yet been found, but wound has been sewed up and the president is now coming out of the inuence of the chloroform. McKinley spread slowly in London The first ticker reports were discredited; then, with the confirmation and general dissemination of the news, arose a far-reaching feeling of sorrow and indignation which, wherever Amer-icans were gathered, almost gained the proportions of a panic, accompanied by feverish anxiety for further details. The thousands of Americans now in London were mostly at the theatres when the news arrived; and, returning to their hotels, found anxious groups of Englishmen and Americans discussng what, without distinction of race, s regarded as a national calamity. The announcement of the attempted ssasssination was received too late or extra editions of the papers to an-

For a few oments there was utter silence and then Mr. Morgan turned to Mr. Satterlee, his son-in-law, and communicated the news to him. At the time he had his hat and cane in hand ready to go home.
