The wounded were taken to Rus tenburg, half way between Pretoria and Mafeking, Lord Kitchener confirms the heavy losses of the Boers, about 250 killed and 300 wounded, during their attack on Fort Itala and Fort Prospect. He says the guns recently captured at Vlakfontein have been recovered from the Boers.
