caped to the woods. The outlaw in the meantime, in his ight, had run upon Dan Anderson, a white man who was hunting, and, be ieving the man to be an officer, had without warning shot him down. Jones was finally surrounded in a vacan house, but kept the small posse at bay with his rifle and finally escaped. The sheriff increased his posse and resumed the hunt this morning, follow-ing the trail for miles, when the negro

was finally surrounded in a live oak prairie near Higdon. At the sight of the posse the outlaw opened fire and a vigorous fusillade ontinued for several minutes. After the smoke had cleared, Sheriff Arm-

strong and Deputy Yarborough were both wounded, one ball striking the former in the head. Neither officer however, is fatally wounded. negro outlaw was also found prostrate in his own blood, with several wounds in his body. He is yet alive.
