THE CELL OPENED.

A Thorough Examination. What is Found. No Confession.

RICHMOND, Va., Jan. 27.—To-day, the 12th after the execution of Thos. J. Grothe, the cell occupied during his confinement in the city jail was opened and examined.

The reporters' main object was to find some evidence of confession, but their search was in vain. A small memorandum book was found in the inside pocket of the prisoner's suit.
